Disability covered by Social Security

Disability benefits are payable under both the regular social security program and the supplemental security income (SSI) program. The regular social security disability program is financed by contributions which workers and their employers make to the trust funds during their working years. To qualify for social security disability benefits, a person must meet certain work requirements. The amount of benefits payable is directly related to the worker's earnings before becoming disabled. SSI payments, on the other hand, are financed entirely from the general revenues of the United States Treasury, and there is no covered work requirement. This program provides benefits for aged, blind, and disabled people who are in financial need.
