Time to start thinking about making pickles, relishes, salsas, and preserving any and all surplus fruits and vegetables. You can add a refreshing touch to any meal with crisp homemade pickles. Most everyone has a favorite recipe, but should you want to try another, here are some old favorites.

GREEN TOMATO RELISH
4 cups ground green tomatoes
4 cups ground cabbage
4 cups ground green onions
12 green peppers, chopped
8 sweet red peppers
Hot red peppers to individual taste
1/4 cup salt
1/4 cup sugar
1 tablespoon celery seed

Grind vegetables coarsely (be careful with the red pepper). Sprinkle with salt. Let stand overnight. Rinse and drain. Combine remaining ingredients with vegetables. Heat to boiling, and simmer 30 minutes. Pack into sterilized pint jars, leaving a 1/2 inch head space. Seal. Process about 15 minutes in boiling water.

CRISP PICKLE SLICES
4 quarts thinly sliced unpeeled cucumbers
6 onions thinly sliced
2 green peppers thinly sliced
1 clove of garlic
1/2 cup kosher salt
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup cider vinegar
1 tablespoon mustard seed
1/4 teaspoon celery seed
1/4 teaspoon turmeric
1 green cucumber, onion, green pepper, and garlic. Add salt; cover with cracked ice and mix thoroughly. Let stand 1 hour. Drain well; remove garlic. Combine sugar, vinegar, mus-

Update on activities..... Special committee to tour Maxey Flats

A tour of the Maxey Flats Nuclear Waste site will be conducted for the Special Advisory Committee on Radioactive Waste Disposal at 1:30 a.m. Wednesday, Sept. 13. In a meeting at 11 a.m. in the Fleming County High School in Flemingsburg, the committee will discuss the state's contract with the Nuclear Engineering Company of Louisville (NECO). Charles Wickliffe, Executive Department of Finance and Administration, and Charles Hardin, Department for Human Resources, will update the committee on current activities and future plans at Maxey Flats. Also named to the committee are Dr. Douglas Humphrey, professor of physics at Western Kentucky University and Dr. Alren Jacobson, a radiological physicist at the University of Louisville. Dr. Margaret Heasley, a professor in the Department of Biological Sciences at Morehead State University has also been named to the committee. Irving Bell, director of the consumer health protection division in the Kentucky Department for Human Resources and Jack Wilson, executive assistant and Sen. John A. "Dick" Rice, D. Winchester. Both legislators' districts include Maxey Flats.

Apply now to hunt fowl

FRANKFORT-Applications for waterfowl hunting at Callard Wildlife Management Area must be postmarked no later than Sept. 23. Fish and Wildlife Commissioner Carl E. Keys said today. Applications must include both a first and alternate choice of hunting dates. Goose hunting will open in the Ballard area Nov. 27 and continue through Jan. 20 and duck hunting will be allowed there Dec. 2 through Jan. 31. (Statewide goose hunting dates are Nov. 15-Jan. 30 and the statewide duck hunting season will run Nov. 16-Nov. 30 and Dec. 3-Jan. 11.) Each letter of application (no telephone calls will be accepted) will be limited to the names of six persons and must contain the following: names and addresses of all hunters in party; preference for duck or goose hunting; a fee of \$8 per day per hunter (only cashiers' checks, certified checks or money orders accepted), and a self-addressed, stamped envelope. The envelope with the word "reservation" marked on the outside. Failure to comply with any of the above will result in return of the application without action, Keys said.

Hunters will be limited to four hunters per season with only one Saturday hunt (the area is closed on Sundays and no reservations may be made only by advance of one week in letter of application) and the date of the reservation, and will be longer allowed on the morning of the hunt.
