Tomatoes
University of Kentucky Food Specialists recommend the addition of four seasons of bottled lemon juice to each quart of tomatoes or tomato juice canned. Use one-half this amount for pickles. Process in a hot water bath 15 minutes for quarts and 10 minutes for pints. Specialists recommend the addition of lemon juice because the acidity of the tomato is less. High acidity of the tomato is safe to organisms but hot water bath treatment is necessary to prevent the growth of Clostridium botulinum. Citric acid per quart can be used instead of the lemon juice, or two tablespoons of 5% vinegar to each quart. Citric acid or lemon juice does not affect the flavor or the tomatoes as much as vinegar.

Sweet Spreads
Most recipes make only a few jars of spreads because quick cooking helps keep the fresh color and flavor of the fruit. Use a large, flat-bottomed kettle so the mixture will come to a boil quickly. Use a long handled wooden spoon for stirring.

Food specialists recommend boiling water for spreading jars, process the jelly in boiling hot water and seal immediately. Use regular two-piece canning lids or a thin layer of hot melted paraffin. Do not wait for the jelly to cool before using the paraffin

For spreads — process in a full rolling boil. Allow 5 minutes for fruit to boil, then add lemon juice and spices; allow 20 minutes for preserves. Store fruit spreads in a cool, dark, dry place. Once a jar is opened, keep the lid on the jar and store it in the refrigerator.

Freezing Cans on the Cob
A vegetable brend and running cold water clean the silks that cling to the corn. Sort ears according to size. Heat them in boiling water: 7 minutes for small ears, 9 minutes for medium ears and 11 minutes for large ears. Cool the ears promptly and thoroughly in ice water and drain. Package in moisture vapor proof paper, a bag, Seal, label and freeze immediately.

Whole Kernel Corn
Select ears with plump, tender kernels and thin, sweet milk. Place husks in washed corn in boiling water for four minutes. Cool promptly in ice water. Cut corn from the cob about 1/2 inch below the top of the husk. Package, leaving one-half inch head-space. Seal, label and freeze immediately.

Cream Style
Follow the directions for whole kernel corn in this layer of hot melted paraffin. Do not wait for the jelly to cool before using the paraffin

Whole Kernel Corn
Select ears with plump, tender kernels and thin, sweet milk. Place husks in washed corn in boiling water for four minutes. Cool promptly in ice water. Cut corn from the cob about 1/2 inch below the top of the husk. Package, leaving one-half inch head-space. Seal, label and freeze immediately.

If it is pumped up too hard and the increased pressure continues for a period of time, it presses on the optic nerve — the sensing nerve. This pressure will gradually destroy the nerve and cause blindness.

Dr. Donald R. Bergama, University of Ky. ophthalmologist, said there are several types of glaucoma. In the most common, chronic glaucoma, there are no early symptoms that make the patient aware he has a serious condition.

And yet, without warning symptoms, the optic nerve is being damaged. The field of vision (that is, the distance the patient can see to the sides while looking straight ahead) what is seen out of the corners of the eyes) gradually diminishes.

state and the state has no evidence as to whether this product is safe and reliable, Mr. Waters said.

Mr. Waters said that Alpine Chemical promotes the herbicide by claiming that it is comparable to and yet cheaper than a Monsanto product known as Roundup. But he said that he has serious doubts that these claims are accurate, and said the illegal herbicide is probably heavily diluted with diesel fuel or mineral spirit.

"This company has no holding in the state of Kentucky, and if farmers buy this herbicide they'll probably waste their money. By the same token, we (the Division of Hazardous Materials and Waste Management) must find a place for farmers to dispose of this product once they find out it is useless, which is virtually impossible," said Mr. Waters.

Mr. Waters is urging farmers who receive telephone calls from any pesticide or herbicide dealer to contact their county pesticide agencies before purchasing this type of product.
