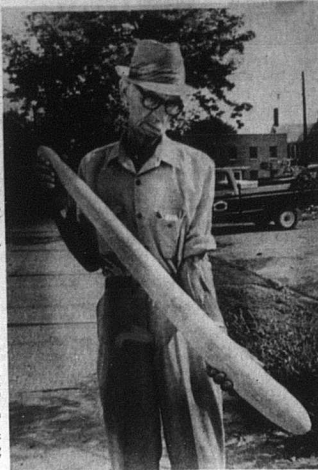

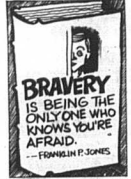

Land Fill legislation deadline

Oct. 30

The Nicholas County Land Fill permit expired Sept. 8. A state inspector told the Fiscal Court that the deadline had been extended until Oct. 30 so that improvements can be made there. She stated that cover is necessary daily and that a diversion ditch around the Land Fill is necessary to keep unauthorized persons out. She said she realized that the county has had bulldozer problems which have hindered Land Fill operations. Thus, the time extension.

Judge again recommends Ecton

for road supervisor's job

Stating that the court needs to stop looking around and hire a road supervisor, County Judge/Executive Reese Smoot again recommended the only state-certified applicant, John Ecton, for the job.

Having the ability to vote on an Attorney General's opinion, Judge Smoot voted for the motion as did Magistrates Paul Tischer and James Anderson who both stated Ecton is the best qualified applicant.

Taking the vote 3-2, Magistrates Bus Atkinson, Bob Livingston and Melvin Pyrrman voted against the motion. Magistrate Livingston stated that they wish to select another applicant and then have him certified by the state for the position. He added that certification should not have been obtained before Court approval.

Judge Smoot said that based on a telephoned opinion from the Attorney General's office, after a tie vote, and after waiting 15 days, he may appoint the road supervisor without Court approval. He stated that he will appoint Ecton when the 15 days are up.

County City can operate cemetery
County Attorney Jack Conley reported that he had received an Attorney General's opinion that a county and city can operate a cemetery together.

The group plans to meet soon with the city and Carlisle cemetery directors to discuss this matter.

Conley read a hospital board resolution to the court and asked that it be recorded in the minutes of Fiscal Court. It named The First National Bank as the hospital-nursing home depository for the next year.

Conley also read a letter from the Corps of Engineers saying that they are not interested in doing a study on a possible dam on Coon Creek because it is not feasible, especially for flood control, the Corps main interest. A new county treasurer was discussed. Applicants will be interviewed at the next meeting.

Court buys dumpster truck and holds rejects dumpster bid
The Magistrates voted unanimously to accept Sam Cummins, Paris, bid of \$11,793 for a dumpster truck. They also accepted the \$10,800 Smith Sanitation Equipment bid for a hoist.

The Court rejected the dumpster bid as too high and it will readvertise for dumpsters. There is \$13,497 left to purchase dumpsters of the \$30,000 grant awarded the county.
