Children sometimes show emotional problems in unusual ways, according to Dr. Paul Stratton, chief psychologist in children's work for Bluegrass West Comprehensive Care centers.

Children may show problems by speaking with a stutter, he said, or they may "freeze" failing grades in school. They may just be isolated, withdrawn, and not playing with friends. Or they may act too grown up, never behaving like the young child.

Dr. Stratton, who works in Nicholas and six other counties served by Bluegrass West, said Comprehensive Care centers offer a variety of services to families who are puzzling over why a child is behaving a certain way or who wonder what can be done about certain behavior.

Chapel gets funds

U.S., Ky. growing report

WEATHER AND GENERAL: Showers throughout August resulted in mostly an adequate supply of moisture for all areas of the State except Western Kentucky. Some Western areas had little or no rain until the last three days of the month. Dry conditions since the first of September have helped tobacco and hay harvest but rain is now needed for late soybeans and pastures. Corn production in Kentucky is estimated at 111.3 million bushels — down 9 per cent from last year, but up 2 per cent from last month. Estimated yield at 86 bushels in 4 bushels below last year, but up 2 bushels from last month. Acreage intended for grain at 1,940,000 acres in 79,000 acres below last year. Showers during August improved corn prospects in all areas except Western Kentucky. Early corn harvest in Western Kentucky is showing substantial yield reductions due to the drought.

U. S. Corn production is forecast at a record 4.80 billion bushels, 3 per cent above last year. Estimated yield at 106.3 bushels c o m p a r e s with 91.0 bushels last year.

Kentucky's soybean production is expected to total 77.7 million bushels — down 9 per cent from last year's record crop. U. S. soybean production is forecast at a record 1.77 billion bushels, 3 per cent above last year. Estimated yield at 28.0 bushels compares with 29.5 bushels last year.

Kentucky's burley crop is estimated at 415.8 million pounds slightly above last year. Estimated acreage or harvest at 168,000 acres is down 5 per cent last expected yield at 2,475 pounds per acre is 115 pounds above last year. Showers during August promoted good growth and heavy crop is expected in the major producing areas. Reporters indicated 40 per cent of the crop was cut by Sept. 8 compared with 60 per cent last year. Because of the late season of the crop there is some tobacco concern that some tobacco is being cut green.

Burley Belt Tobacco production is forecast at 622 million pounds, 5 million pounds above last year.

The center's other services for children include school consultations, parent education classes, custody evaluations, and referrals to other agencies when needed.

Children's workers are on each of the four Comprehensive Care teams in the seven county area. One team serves Franklin County, and the others are in Anderson, Woodford, Scott, Harrison, Bourbon and Nicholas Counties. Dr. Stratton and two other workers, Margaret Segrest and Vicki Schankula, assist all four teams.

Dr. Stratton said the increased divorce rate and television are among the things that are putting more pressure on today's families. "The world is changing far more rapidly in many different ways than we were accustomed to as children or as our parents prepared us for. Consequently there are people alternatives to choose from and we often have difficulty in making choices and making them work for us," he said.

In divorce, he said, children "often reflect the conflict in their actions, feel responsible for the conflict, or do not express their feelings of affection or anger for the separate parents".

Telation, he said, presents an "interesting and entertaining pastime. The liability through is that people are not interacting with people while they are watching. Parents aren't playing games with their children or talking over what happened during the day. And the children aren't interacting with one another. So these people-people bonds are maybe weaker as a result. TV also presents models for children. These can be of desirable social behavior, or, as is more often the case, they can demonstrate the excitement and techniques of crime and violence".

Dr. Stratton said there is more understanding now concerning child-rearing.

"We understand more about emotional and cognitive development of children and basically are better able to teach children. And after all, being a parent is being a teacher. We teach a child the rules of our household and the moral values of our family that we want our children to pass on to their children."

Dr. Stratton, who just recently joined the Comprehensive Care staff, is a native of Michigan. He received bachelor, masters and doctorate degrees from Michigan State University. He has taught at the University of Kentucky and Transylvania University. Comprehensive Care Centers operate on a nonprofit basis, with fees based on ability to pay.
