Extension Office has burley info

The County Extension Office has information available to help farmers who want to market burley tobacco in bale form.

An experimental marketing program, approved by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, allows the limited sale of burley packaged in bale form during the 1978-79 marketing year. Producers may market in the loose-leaf form up to 10 per cent or 1,500 pounds of their allotment, whichever is greater.

Mike Phillips, County Extension agent for agriculture, says he has a publication available on how to package and handle burley tobacco in bales at the farm. The publication was prepared by Extension specialists and researchers in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture as part of the bale-only experimental loose-leaf program.

The leaflet, "Preparing Burley in Bales," includes plans for building a simple, economical bale press and gives instructions on making proper size and quality bales. Mr. Phillips says that materials costs are estimated at \$30 to \$40 to build a 1400-lb burley bale press. A bumper type car jack is used to provide the compression force.

Each grade of tobacco. "This permits each grade of leaves to be continuously placed into a box, protecting the leaves from excessive drying in heated stripping rooms and reducing the possibility of contamination," says Mr. Phillips. One jack presshead can be used with several boxes.

Mr. Phillips points out that several tobacco producers may want to build and share the bale boxes to keep costs down and to get more use out of the equipment.

The experimental loose-leaf burley marketing program is being administered by the Council for Burley Tobacco in cooperation with federal, state and other public agencies as well as tobacco industry representatives.

Educational information and details about the program and procedures for participating in it are available from your County Extension Office.

Tobacco producers interested in marketing 1978-79 burley in the bale form are required to sign up Sept. 1, 1978 at the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office. The ASCS office will assist the producer who wants to participate in the bale program.
