**FRANKFORT** — The Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) has approved a \$21,500 grant to the Western Fleming County Water System to help fund an expansion project, according to Gov. Julian Carroll.

William L. Short, Carroll's alternate on the ARC and secretary of the Kentucky Development Cabinet, said the expansion would provide service to industrial, commercial and residential customers in the western portion of the Flemingsburg growth center and outlying areas as well. Initially, 112 new customers will be served, he added. Short also explained that the project

will permit the Farmers Home Administration to proceed with plans for a 16-unit housing project in the Elmaville area of the service district.

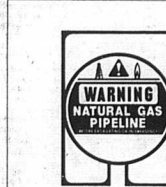

• Fire "coming from the ground," or burning in the air on a pipeline right-of-way.  
• Discoloration of vegetation is another clue.  
• Detection of a peculiar or unfamiliar odor may indicate a line leak.  
If you encounter what you think may be a pipeline emergency, warn others and LEAVE THE AREA QUICKLY. Then call the pipeline safety line: 1-800-821-5486.

Barley Tobacco, a group funded by marketing card checks and representing the entire industry, worked out a program using bales and price supports and grades. One of the reasons given for the denial of the marketing experiment last season was the lack of agreement on a single package.  
(Some segments of the industry wanted the package to be "sheets" or canvas bags filled with loose leaves, the process used on the Carolina market. However, it was felt this package would use too much warehouse space as compared to bales and might result in a longer selling season and designated selling days.)  
The University of Kentucky has developed a baler that can be made with materials available locally. The cost for a one-compartment baler is estimated at about \$60, plus labor. Plans for this baler and additional
