Taulbee killed in wreck

Dennis Taulbee, a 35-year-old employee of South Central Bell and resident of Nicholas County, died last Monday night when his car struck a tree on the Jackstown Road in Bourbon County.

Taulbee was returning home from work when his car left the road and struck a tree head-on. He was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident.

Sheriff Ecton hospitalized

Nicholas County Sheriff J. W. Ecton, Jr. has entered St. Joseph's Hospital in Lexington for tests and observation following two apparent fainting spells he experienced last week.

Last Thursday Ecton was turning his water truck from the Locust Grove Road onto the Moorefield Road near his

septic tanks drained or who must add additional feet in the septic tank drain field.

—Clean up of Brushy Park.
The availability of significant quantities of water at adequate pressure for firefighting.

The only disadvantage to the project, Hasnall said, would be that residents in the area would be subject to city taxes of 25 cents per \$100 valuation.

However, Hasnall said, the savings in fire insurance would nearly equal the city taxes in some cases. For example, he said the savings on a \$30,000 frame house would be \$72 while city taxes would equal \$75. On a \$30,000 brick house the taxes would be \$75 and fire insurance savings would be \$48.

After Thursday's meeting and conferences among the council and fiscal court it was decided not to seek the \$50,000 BEAD grant because of expected opposition to the annexation plan. Five of the 16 residents present said they would oppose the project, presumably on the annexation clause.

be charged when the lines were installed and others felt annexation would mean higher taxes, which it would. That area pays only county taxes; annexation would mean they would be liable for city property taxes of 25 cents per \$100 valuation. The prospect of having city services such as water, sewer, police and fire evidently was not appealing enough to the residents to insure no opposition.
Meanwhile, the project is back where it started. The \$400,000 price tag it carries today will rise with the rate of inflation and the problem of discharge into Brushy Park will continue as will the problem of overloaded septic tank systems. But the council and fiscal court felt they could not go ahead with a project that was not acceptable to the people involved, no matter how handy it may be needed.

ears although one recent office-seeker promised a lodge if elected. Then when he was elected he commissioned a feasibility study that did not support the request for a lodge, thereby getting him off the hook easily.
(That same politician also blessed his home town with a \$50,000 or so clubhouse for its golf course, a facility that, unlike a lodge at Blue Licks, will not bring in any revenue.)
From talking with those concerned it becomes apparent that everyone wishes the incident forgotten, no doubt because of the embarrassment it would have caused had the state media gotten wind of the story.

It seems from this standpoint that although it is admirable the parks department wants to improve the Booneborough museum it should not be done by raiding the Blue Licks facility. No doubt the artifacts would have made a valuable addition to the park's museum but then, the fact would make a valuable addition to the Blue Licks park. Building it here makes about as much sense as taking the artifacts from Blue Licks to Booneborough. As much as some state officials would like to rewrite history it won't wash and in this case the parks department did the smart thing by returning the artifacts — even if they had to be prodded a little to do it.
