

# Spring sports report

Baseball action has begun again. The Nicholas County Bluejackets selected the Mason County Royals 6-0 in their second home game, Wednesday, April 11.

A double, knocking in the final run of the game, by freshman Mike Wootley proved to be the lining break for the Jackets.

"We're going on schedule," stated Coach Billy K. Anderson. "We need to play to improve. Four out of seven games have already been rained out."

Neither team scored in the first inning and Jackie Wells pitcher, allowed the Royals no hits. Mason County crunched homeplate twice in the second while Nicholas County came up short.

Mason's 2-0 lead decreased as Nicholas notched a run to narrow the Royals lead 5-1 at the third inning's end. Both teams struggled, but neither could score in the fourth inning. A home run in the fifth by Tim Moreland aided the Jackets to their four-run inning, giving the Jackets a 9-2 lead.

A run by the Jackets proved to be the only scoring in the sixth inning. An attempt of three runs, by the Royals in the seventh was just not enough as the Jackets tossed in the 6-5 win without using their final time out.

The win by Wells gave him a 2-0 record. Tim Moreland had two out of three hits. Mike Hatten, Dean Hinton, Mike Sowell, and Mark Vice each had one hit.

Mason County had five runs on five hits with one error. Nicholas County had three on eight hits with two errors. Other scores for the week were Paris 10, Nicholas 4; Nicholas 13, Bourbon 9 (winning pitcher freshman Kirk Matlock); Douglas 10, Nicholas 8; Nicholas 4, Nicholas 5; Montgomery 1 (winning pitcher Jackie Wells). Nicholas County's record is now 4-3.

Golf

Swinging into '79 season, the Nicholas County Bluejacket golf team placed fourth in an annual tournament Saturday at the University of Kentucky. The Bluejackets team was fourth out of 12 teams competing. Caddie with 304, Boone County, was 309, and Henry City with 316 battled the Jackets for the top three places.

Tim Dudley led the Bluejackets with a low 75. Sam Dudley, Greg Haney, and Mark Taylor each shot 82 to tally Nicholas County's total score of 221. Friday, April 6, the Jackets placed second, with a score of 171, in front of the University of Breckinridge, 179, and behind Harrison County, 178.

The team's individual scores were Greg Haney 66, Tim Dudley 63, and Sam Dudley and Mark Taylor with 41 each.

"Third and final call for..." these words were heard frequently by many Nicholas County tracksters last week. Nicholas County tracksters, defending 1978 Class A Regional champion, overcame some stiff competition defeating three teams in a meet, at home, April 4. The Bluejackets scored 84, while Paris scored 60%, Mason County scored 16% and Mendee scored nine.

The Lady Jacket team showed bright

as they too were victorious. The Nicholas County girls scored 64, Mason County scored 61, Paris scored 21, and Mendee scored 15.

Friday, of the same week, the Jacket took on a Legends Grand County team. The Braves weren't skilled enough as the jackets' boys won 97-38 and the Lady Jackets won 74-44.

"Our team is doing a fine job," said Coach Ben Pumphrey. "The girls are progressing exceptionally well."

2 cups shredded cheddar cheese

Cook rice according to package directions. Cook spinach and drain well. Meanwhile, beat eggs; add milk, butter, onion, parsley, Worcestershire sauce, salt, thyme and thyme, mixing well. Stir in rice, spinach and cheese. Turn into a greased 8-inch square

# Kay's Kitchen

Easter is usually the time to introduce springtime to your wardrobe, home, and especially to your palate. We welcome the return of really fresh and plentiful asparagus, spring onions, strawberries and other delights of spring.

This year, since Easter does come around the middle of April, we can hope for a warm Easter, and not one spent by the fire. So let's really have a special Easter dinner, be it the traditional ham or whatever your family enjoys. Here are some suggestions.

ROASTED LAMB  
With a sharp knife, cut slits in lamb and insert rosemary and silvers of garlic. For the average leg of lamb about eight or ten places should be enough. Pig meat on rack in roasting pan. Place in oven and turn to 250 degrees and roast about 30 minutes per pound. You must be the judge for doneness since it would depend on how you like your lamb. Do baste while cooking. And don't forget the mint sauce when ready to serve.

FRENCH CHOCOLATE SOUFFLE  
1 tablespoon (1 envelope) unflavored gelatin  
1 cup milk  
1/2 ounce pkg. semisweet chocolate pieces  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
4 egg yolks  
1/2 cup whites  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 cup whipping cream  
1 cup chopped pecans

Sprinkle gelatin over milk in saucepan to soften. Stir in chocolate, sugar, salt and egg yolks until blended. Heat over low heat, stirring constantly, until gelatin is dissolved and chocolate is melted. Cool. Beat egg whites to soft peaks; gradually add 1/4 cup sugar, beating to stiff peaks. Fold egg whites into chocolate mixture. Fold in whipped cream. Spoon half cup of the pecans and fold in the rest. Pour mixture into serving dish and chill. You may pour mixture into individual dessert dishes.

When ready to serve top with additional whipped topping and remaining nuts.

# Baryshnikov at the White House

Mikhail Baryshnikov, hailed as one of the greatest dancers of the century, puts on a dazzling command performance for the President when KETV presents "Baryshnikov at the White House," Easter Sunday, April 15, at 8 P.M.

The program, taped February 25 in the East Room of the executive mansion, is one in a series of public television broadcasts of White House performances by distinguished artists.

Baryshnikov, in seeming defiance of the laws of gravity, leaps, dances and dances with partners Patricia McBride and Heather Watts to the choreography of George Balanchine and Jerome Robbins.

As a highlight in the performance, Baryshnikov and his colleagues from the New York City Ballet are again spotlighted by a group of young ballet students in a selection from "Harcourade," a delightful version of Italian spade. Other dance selections include segments from Balanchine's "Crabbeaux."

Last June Baryshnikov again made headlines when he left the American Ballet Theatre of Washington to join the New York City Ballet and explore the repertoire of George Balanchine and Jerome Robbins.
