Water leaking

into rock layers at Maxey Flats

Water in the trenches at the nuclear waste dumping site at Maxey Flats is still making its way into the rock layers below the trenches, according to a report presented to the legislature's special Advisory Committee on Nuclear Waste Disposal.

The U. S. Geological Survey conducted the tests at Maxey Flats that confirmed the water is migrating but it could not be determined in which direction the water is flowing.

The state will be studying the possibility of permanently closing the dumping site. Maxey Flats has been closed to dumping since December, 1977.
