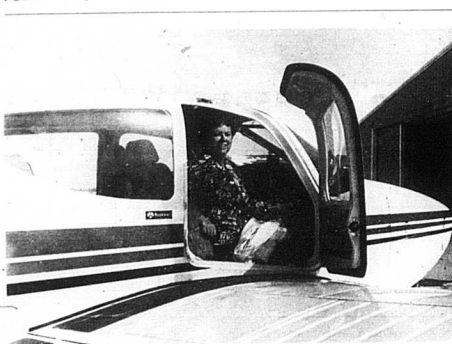




### Jock's jokes and All-10th Region team

### Frankfort aviatrix plans entry in all-lady race

Erline "Dee" McCollum, who with her husband, Bruce, formerly managed the Cynthiana airport, will compete in a ladies only air race June 16 in California. The McCollums now live in Frankfort where he is an aircraft mechanic for the state government. — State photo.

Erline (Dee) McCollum of Frankfort is a self-proclaimed Kentucky aviatrix, traveling thousands of miles each year pursuing her lifelong love — flying.

During her childhood, Mrs. McCollum spent countless hours watching huge cargo "air clippers" lumber in and out of their hangers in Florida. At age 17, she was initiated at the controls of an airplane. At 18, she bought her first plane.

On the morning of June 16, Mrs. McCollum and her copilot, Diane Stafford will be the 12th of 100 team entries taking off from Santa Monica, Calif., on the first leg of the 2,000-mile Hughes Alvest Air Race Classic, a women-only contest commemorating the 50th anniversary of women's air racing.

Before the aviatrixes reach their destination in Milwaukee, they will make stops in Sacramento, Calif., Klamath Falls, Ore., Walla Walla, Wash., Great Falls, Mont., Sheridan, Wyo., Hismarck, N.D., and Minneapolis.

The winning team will earn a \$5,000 first prize. The runner-up and next best finishers split \$15,000.

More than 30 years have passed since she made her maiden flight, but Mrs. McCollum's zest and enthusiasm for the sport of flying are greater than ever. She is the daughter of an Air Force captain and a native of Indianapolis.

"I've been adopted state of Kentucky," Mrs. McCollum will carry promotional material about Kentucky attractions with her on the trip, distributing them along the route.

Mrs. McCollum and her husband Bruce are employed by the Air Transport Division of the state Department of Finance in Frankfort. They live less than a mile from their office at the Frankfort Municipal Airport.

The McCollums managed an airport for 10 years from 1970 to 1973 before taking jobs with the state.

Mrs. McCollum's copilot, Diane Stafford, was born in Owensboro. The Kentucky duo expect to average approximately 150 miles per hour during the race in a sleek new twin-engine Rockwell speedster supplied by a local leasing agent, Central Kentucky Aircraft.

Entries in the Hughes Classic are restricted to unmodified, stock airplanes employing any means of propulsion except jet or turbocharging engines.

Mrs. McCollum is unimpaired to recruit at least two more sponsors to help defray a portion of the expenses for the trip which will total about \$6,000, including the \$500 entry fee.

### Utility rate commission members are announced

Governor Julian Carroll announced last week his appointments to the two new public utilities which will replace the Public Service Commission in regulation of the state's public utilities.

The governor named Perry H. White Jr., an attorney who is currently executive director of the Public Service Commission, to serve as chairman for a three-year term of the new Energy Regulatory Commission, which will deal full-time with the state's electric and gas utilities.

Charles Lambert, who is currently deputy secretary of the Department of Finance, has been named to a three-year term as vice chairman of the ERCC, and Dr. Claude Vaughan, an economist currently serving as executive director of the Governor's Economic Development Commission, as a member for a two-year term.

The legislative interim for 1978-79 will end in October. During this second half of the interim, committees will be actively seeking the public's opinions by holding hearings and visiting communities across the state.
