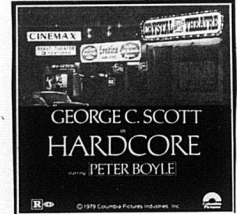

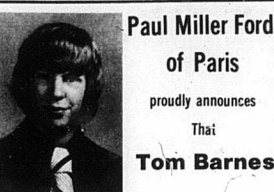

Dairy sale at Western

Kentucky youngsters who wish to start into the dairy cattle business or even add to their present herd will have the opportunity to bid on some high quality animals April 28 at the Seventh Annual All Breeds Dairy Heifer Sale to be conducted at the Western Kentucky University, Bowling Green.

The objective of the sale, which is sponsored by the Kentucky Purchased Dairy Cattle Association in cooperation with the Kentucky Department of Agriculture, is to allow young people the chance to purchase top registered animals for use in a 4-H or FFA Dairy Project. This year, approximately 30-35 heifers are to be offered for sale.
A segment of the sale which this year will be the "Production Award" part. All heifers of all breeds, with birth 1 through December 31, 1978, will be in this part of the sale. Twenty (20) per cent of the gross sale of the "Production Award" animals will be set aside for an award distributed on the following basis:
First place, 25 per cent; second place, 20 per cent; third place, 15 per cent; fourth place, 10 per cent; fifth place, 10 per cent; sixth place, 10 per cent; seventh place, five per cent; and eighth place, five per cent.
These animals will be based on the most four per cent fat corrected milk from the heifers first 300 day lactation, provided they calves before reaching 28 months of age. Records must be made in DHI or regularly organized DHI. There will also be Junior Calves, Junior Yearlings, and Senior Yearlings offered for sale which will be a part of the "Production Award."
