Pharmacists receive
Pharmacists participating in Kentucky's Medicaid program now receive more compensation for filling Medicaid prescriptions, a state Department for Human Resources official has announced.

Those pharmacists may now receive up to \$1.35 for each prescription for Medicaid clients. That amount is the "dispensing fee" and is paid in addition to the cost of the prescription drug. The new maximum rate is 13 cents more than the former rate.

Marionette routine conveys message on child abuse

Three marionettes stand in a row — father, mother, little girl. They begin to dance in unison. But the little girl can't keep in step. The father marionette becomes impatient and slaps her, breaking the string to her right arm. The three resume dancing. Again, the mother lashes out, breaking the string to the child's left arm. Now, the little girl must dance with both arms hanging motionless at her sides.

These are not puppets. They are three people trying to convey "a message without words. They are a Lexington music troupe called "Rubber Gloves."

The subject of this marionette routine is child abuse, and it is one of about a dozen pieces the troupe will perform at the Kentucky State Fair at the state Department for Human Resources exhibit. Other routines will cover a range of human concerns, including job hunting, welfare fraud and poison prevention.

All routines were written by the mines for the Human Resources Department and will premiere at the fair. Rubber Gloves' member, Nola Hooper said the development of the routine presented a challenge to her and to fellow mines Michael Thompson

and Donna Glassford. "There's nothing funny about child abuse. How do you do it lightly and still explain it's a real problem?" she noted. "To illustrate the problem and to show how parents can get help from Human Resources programs, the troupe chose to use the roles of marionettes. How can someone say so much without speaking?" As Hooper explains it, mine is a matter of "sense, memory." A good mine can make you believe he is drinking a glass of water because he can recall the motions needed to do so, and can precisely imitate the movements, she said.

Terry Trussell named county arthritis chairman
Terry Trussell of Carlisle, Kentucky has been named 1979 Arthritis Campaign County Chairman for Nicholas County. The appointment was made by the Executive Committee of the Arthritis Foundation. The State Campaign is scheduled for the month of September with a goal of \$27,200.

The Arthritis Foundation is the only 100 per cent participation in this year's field of Arthritis which affects only over 44,000 Kentuckians. Arthritis, the country's Number One crippling disease, actually is a variety of diseases. The cruelest, most severe type is Rheumatoid Arthritis, which afflicts some 6 million people. 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Operator's license for moped

Soaring fuel costs and gas shortages have broadened the market of the newest street machine — the moped. But what many moped owners don't realize is that they must have a valid operator's license to drive a moped in Kentucky.

According to Benita Maffei, transportation safety coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Transportation, state law requires that a driver have a valid license to operate a moped. This means the driver must be at least 16 years old. However, the owner does not have to register the moped, have it insured or wear safety equipment, he said.

Although safety equipment is optional, Maffei encourages all moped riders to wear a helmet. Mopeds are classified as "motor bicycles" and as such must obey the same laws and be given the same courtesies as full-sized vehicles, Maffei said.

He explained that mopeds must obey all rules of the road, they can't be ridden on interstate or toll roads, and that only one person can ride on the moped. In most instances it is illegal to ride a moped on a bicycle, on the sidewalk, or on a full-sized vehicle.

Never ride on heavily traveled main streets — try to stay on quiet streets. Avoid steep inclines; some mopeds don't pull well up steep grades. Optional turn signals can be obtained. If you don't have them, be sure to use hand signals.
