Maysville sees increase in Nicholas students

Nineteen Nicholas County students were enrolled at Maysville Community College last fall. Indications for this fall are that Nicholas County enrollment at the college will increase. Registration for this fall semester classes will begin on August 22 for students returning to the college for their second year. These students may register both Wednesday and Thursday. Registration for students coming to the Maysville Community College for

the first time will be held on Friday and Monday, August 24 and 27. Registration each day will be from 9:11:30 a.m. and from 1:30-4 p.m. Night registration will be held August 27 from 6-8 p.m. Class work for the fall semester will begin on Wednesday, August 29. In addition to the baccalaureate transfer program offered at MCC, in which, students may complete the first year or two of their four year programs, numerous two-year occupations,

all programs are also available. These occupational programs which equip students to enter the world of work in two years or less include: Agricultural Technology, Retail and Business Management, Nursing, Agricultural and Agricultural Business, Professional Secretarial Technology, and Electro-Mechanical Technology. Students may also complete the first year of the Forest and Wood Technology program at Maysville Community College. The second year of this program is completed at the University of Kentucky Wood Utilization Center at Quicksand. Recent information indicates that many well-paying jobs are available throughout Kentucky and in other states for graduates of this course of study.

A concentrated effort was made last year and is continuing this year, to provide more night classes in academic subjects as well as community service courses in order to provide greater service for area residents holding full-time employment. Catalogs for this fall's course offerings are available at Maysville Community College now through registration. An encouraging note for those planning to attend Maysville Community College this year is that tuition charges have not followed the national inflationary trend. Tuition fees are the same this year at MCC as they were in 1972. This makes seven years without increase.
