

**Brown names Grady Stumbo to head DHR**

Grady Stumbo, an Eastern Kentucky physician, was named Secretary of Human Resources and Frank Metta, a Louisville developer was named state Transportation Secretary by Gov.-elect John Y. Brown Jr. last week.

Paul Patton, a Pikeville coal executive, was named Deputy Secretary of Transportation. Brown also appointed Rush Deater of Madisonville, formerly city editor of the Lexington Herald, to his legal staff, where he will work on issues and write some speeches.

In accepting the post, Stumbo said, "I would like to think that my appointment represents the deep and sincere commitment that Gov. Brown has to the people of the state."

Stumbo, who operates a public non-profit clinic in Hindman, said he felt the primary purpose of the Human Resources Department is to serve people. He added that many people feel government is "of the few, by the few, but not for you."

Stumbo said the department's "ultimate goal" should be to "raise the level of human dignity" and added he hoped to make it a "person-oriented department where compassion dominates over competition."

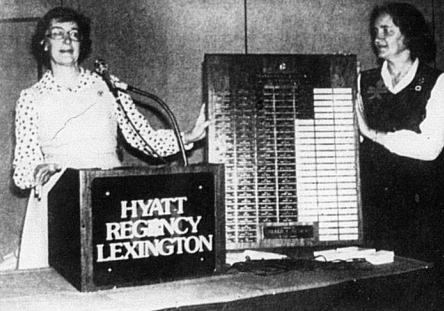
He criticized the department for what he called short-term efforts "to improve its public image," and said he would concentrate on "long-term, pragmatic, patient care to reform" problems in the department.

Asked by a reporter whether he felt the Human Resources Department was too large, Stumbo said there would be no immediate efforts to reduce the size of the department. He said he was more concerned about people than department size but said eventually he looked for a "higher organizational structure" in the Human Resources Department.

In announcing the appointment of Metta, Brown cited Metta's integrity and said that "for too long, we've had

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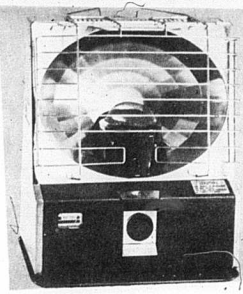

**Burley program comments wanted**

Acting Secretary of Agriculture Jim Williams has asked the public to comment on proposed determinations relating to the amount of the national marketing quota for 1980 crop burley tobacco.

Under current law, the department must announce the amount of the national quota for burley tobacco by the 1980 marketing year no later than Feb. 1. Details on determinations to be made and the legislative provisions on the determinations are scheduled for publication in the Dec. 4 Federal Register.

A meeting will be held to discuss supply and demand and other factors relating to the determinations. It will be held in Lexington, Kentucky, with the exact time and place to be determined. Within 30 days following the announcement of the amount of the national marketing quota, burley tobacco growers will hold a referendum to determine if they wish to be bound by the quota for the next three marketing years beginning October 1, 1980.

Prior to making final determinations, consideration will be given to any written comments received on or before Jan. 17, by the Director, Support and Loan Division, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20015.

All written comments will be available for public inspection during regular business hours at the Office of the Director, Room 254, of the department's South Building.

**Food stamp rules change January 1**

New food stamp eligibility rules to help households with elderly or disabled members go into effect Jan. 1. The new rules provide special medical and shelter deductions for households containing persons age 60 or older or persons who receive Supplemental Security Income or Social Security disability payments.

According to the Department for Human Resources, which administers the federal food stamp program in Kentucky, households making application for food stamps will be able to deduct from their incomes all medical expenses in excess of \$5 per month incurred by an elderly or disabled person in that household. Food stamp eligibility and benefits are based generally on household size and net monthly income after deductions are subtracted.

Under the new rule, medical expenses of elderly or disabled persons are not deductible if such expenses are covered by an insurance policy or other reimbursement plan. The medical expenses of other household members are not allowable deductions.

After Jan. 1, households with elderly or disabled members also may deduct the full amount of shelter costs if those costs exceed half of the household's adjusted income. For all other households, the excess shelter deduction remains limited to \$50.

The food stamp program lists allowable shelter costs as rent and mortgage payments, utility bills, property taxes and insurance on a home.
