Listing Period Homestead Exemption

The PVA Office is now in the listing period — January 1 to March 1 — for the tax roll preparation for 1979. Each taxpayer should report his property at this time.

1. All new homes, improvements to existing homes, and new buildings (barns, etc.)
2. All mobile homes located in Nicholas County. Mobile homes that have been sold should be reported.
3. Cars, boats, travel trailers, etc.
4. Intangibles (stocks, bonds, mortgages, liens, and accounts receivable)

The Homestead Exemption has been raised to \$10,200 for 1979. A property owner must apply for the Homestead Exemption before March 1, 1979.

To be eligible for the Homestead Exemption, a property owner must be 65 years of age during the year of 1979 and own and live on his property. Those previously signed up will be carried over for 1979 automatically.

Jackets win in overtime

"He played well," stated Coach Mike Kenney after Nicholas County's 68-65 victory over Montgomery County, "it was a team effort."

You can expect that "team effort" from the Bluejackets whenever it really counts, as in their four-point win in overtime, last Friday night at Mt. Sterling.

The overtime play was a second success for the Jackets. They forced Richmond Model into defeat, in overtime, earlier this year.

"We won because of our foul shooting," Coach Kenney remarked, "we hit 27 of 40."
With 1:30 left on the clock, the Jackets trailed behind the Indians by seven. Two foul shots by Mark Vice put the Jacket team back within two. A steal by sophomore Mike Sowell, with 17 seconds remaining, gave Nicholas County control of the rebound. A corner shot, tucked neatly in by Mark Raddell, tied the game 41 all as time ticked off to end the game.

A field goal by Mike Hatton raised Nicholas County's score two in the three-minute overtime. Montgomery came back, however, to add two to their tally. Two foul shots each, by Hatton and Sowell, were all the Indians could handle as the overtime ended with Nicholas on top 68-65.

Concentrated shooting by Vice, Hatton, and Sowell, in the first quarter,

plugged the Jackets out in front and gave them a 16-10 lead at the end of the quarter.

With the aid of Hatton's 12, James Anderson's nine, and Mike Wells' seven rebounds, in the second quarter, Nicholas County added 14 more points to maintain their lead of 30-24, at the half. The Indians rallied to shorten the Bluejackets lead as they closed in 47-45.

at the end of the third quarter, Mike Hatton led the Bluejackets offense with 23 points. Mark Vice followed with 16, Mark Raddell had 11, James Anderson had 11, Mike Wells had four, and Mike Sowell had three.
