

## MSU plans music weekend

Morehead State University will host a Weekend for Country Musicians Feb. 25-26, with a list of performers reading like a Who's Who in traditional music. The weekend, organized by MSU's Department of Music and Appalachian Development Center, will feature a variety of music that reveals the traditional sounds of Eastern Kentucky's mountain folk.

"This weekend will focus on regional folk exchanging musical tunes and learning from each other about the music of their culture," said Dr. Glenn Fulbright, Head of MSU's Department of Music and coordinator of the weekend activities. Guest performers include John McCabe of Durganson, Va., former member of the Carter Family, who will present sessions on the banjo, dulcimer, Sybil Clark, 30-year veteran dance caller, who will call the dances Friday evening; and J. P. and Annadene Fraley of Rush who will perform traditional Eastern Kentucky music with Homer Ledford and his band from Winchester.

Other performers include the Ratcliff Family of Martin and the Eagle Country String Band, composed of Law, Roy Ross, Ken Balfanz and Rusty White of MSU. Also performing will be Angie Ratcliff, Martin freshman at MSU. She is following in the musical footsteps of her father, Buddy, who performed with the Little Jimmy Dickens Band and Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs.

"We will emphasize traditional music that the people of the region will know and recognize," added Dr. Fulbright. Activities include working with live music and dance leaders, supplying theory for dance band musicians,

worship for bands and individual musicians, concerts, dancing and singing. "Old time traditional music will be performed by most players, with additional training available for individuals interested in dances of Old English tunes which were abolished around 1851-1760," Dr. Fulbright added.

He continued: "The weekend is open to anyone interested in learning more about traditional music and who is interested in playing traditional music." Registration and additional information is available from Dr. Glenn Fulbright, Department of Music, MSU, Morehead, KY 40301.

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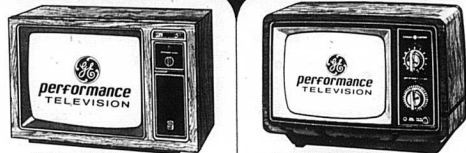

## '79 burley quota remains at 615 million pounds

A national marketing quota for 1979 burley tobacco of 615 million pounds was announced Feb. 2 by Ray Fitzgerald, Administrator of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), U. S. Department of Agriculture. This quota is the same as the 1978 quota of 615 million pounds. When adjustments for over and undermarkings are taken into consideration, effective farm quotas for 1979 are expected to total 604 million pounds, about 2 per cent less than last year. Burley tobacco is grown primarily in Kentucky, Tennessee, North Carolina, Virginia, Ohio and Indiana. Fitzgerald also said farmers should consider taking advantage of pre-measurement services before planting to guarantee the size of their fields. County ASCS Office have details of the pre-measurement service.

### Food stamp changes

Retail food dealers have been reminded that several major changes in the food stamp regulations affecting grocers became effective Jan. 1. Edward W. Davidson, Southeast regional director of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's family nutrition programs, said the most significant of the changes in the requirement that retail food dealers give cash change up to 99 cents. In the past grocers were required to give credit slips or debit bills. Other changes listed by Davidson include: — Hot foods ready for immediate consumption may not be sold for food stamps. — Food stamps may now be used to pay for deposits for bottles. — Grocers are allowed to redeem manufacturers' "cents-off" coupons for food stamp customers in the same manner as they do for cash customers. Davidson said cash register companies have assured the Food and Nutrition Service that they are reprogramming their machines to handle bottle deposits and "cents-off" coupons as fast as possible.
