Have forgotten the original name but have been calling this recipe Minnie Muffins. They are good for small families, or even one or two. Here they are.

MINUTE MUFFINS 1 cup self-rising flour 1/2 cup mayonnaise 1/4 cup sweetener 1/4 cup milk 1/4 cup oil

CHOCOLATE MOUSSE PIE 1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened 2 1/2 ounce squares unsweetened chocolate, melted and cooled 2 eggs

CHOCOLATE MERINGUE BARS 1 cup butter or margarine, softened 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar, 1/2 cup white sugar 3 eggs, separated

CORN-BREAD TOAST 1 1/2 cups cornmeal 1 cup milk 1 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoon brown drippings 1/2 cup water

School age change for first grade and kindergarten The age at which a child may be accepted in a state kindergarten or first grade program was recently changed, according to Mrs. Jane Becker of the Nicholas County School Superintendent's office.

The new regulations provide provisions for parents whose children reach the age between Sept. 1 and Dec. 31 to petition the local board school for their children's enrollment.

Parents wishing to seek exceptions must pick up an application at the superintendent's office and complete it and return before March 1, 1979.

Children who are enrolled in kindergarten or first grade during the 1978-79 school year shall be eligible for enrollment in the first grade in 1979, regardless of the date of their start.

The new regulations also state that children who are six or on before Sept. 1, 1979 cannot avoid the compulsory attendance laws.

With 45 seconds on the clock, Rogers fired a basket to end the scoring in the first quarter, with Nicholas leading 13-10.

A goal by Darrell with only 30 seconds left in the quarter, marked the score 32-25 for the Jackets. Fleming rallied to catch up as the quarter ended with Nicholas still leading 32-25.
