

## Kay's Kitchen

February is over! Could it be there is a thought of spring? Anyway, yesterday and today are the days to think about Easter, and no one can think of Easter and not think of spring. Well to get on with this column, it is time to write about some meatless meals. Not that I have never eaten a recently while trying to save a few dollars. This week I'll give you a few egg recipes that will make a main dish. You need only to add a green vegetable and salad.

**PASTRY TOPPED CASEROLE**  
 8 small onions, sliced  
 1 cup sliced carrots, cooked  
 2 cups diced celery, cooked about 5 minutes and drained  
 4 hard cooked eggs, quartered  
 1/2 cup butter to taste  
 1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup  
 Place cooked vegetables in a greased quart shallow baking dish. Add eggs as a second layer. Season with salt and pepper. Add several dashes of Worcestershire sauce, about 1 teaspoon seasoned salt, and a dash of hot pepper sauce to soup and pour over eggs. Top with narrow strips of pastry. Bake in a 400 degree oven until pastry is well browned and filling is bubbly, about 15 minutes. Grated cheese may be added at the very last, before adding pastry, if desired.

**WELSH RAREBIT**  
 2 tablespoons butter  
 1 pound grated cheddar cheese  
 1 teaspoon dry mustard  
 Few drops hot pepper sauce  
 1 cup evaporated milk  
 Dash of Worcestershire sauce  
 Melt butter in heavy saucepan. When butter is melted add cheese and seasonings to hot liquid. Stir in milk and stir vigorously. When mixture is smooth remove from heat and add beaten eggs. Stir for two to three minutes or until mixture thickens.  
 Serve with toasted almonds on toast square. Good served on toasted French bread or English muffins.

**DEVILED EGGS WITH**  
 4 eggs, beaten  
 1/2 cup green pepper, chopped  
 1 tablespoon grated onion  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 Dash of pepper  
 1 can deviled ham, small  
 Mix all ingredients together. Bake as you would pancakes, allowing 1/2 cup of batter for each pancake. Brown first on one side and then the other. Serve on toasted bread. Top with spoonful of catsup if desired.

## Drivers attending DUI schools

Kentuckians convicted of driving while intoxicated are taking advantage of an alternative to having their licenses revoked, according to state transportation officials.  
 Currently 41 Alcohol Driver Education clinics are operated in 20 locations in Kentucky by the Transportation Department's division of driver licensing for people receiving first offense convictions for driving while under the influence of alcohol.  
 The "graduates" are put back on the road with their chances of driving again while intoxicated drastically reduced.  
 During 1978, 1979, Kentuckians at revocation of their licenses. Records show that the number of participants in the clinics has grown each year since the clinics were initiated in 1974.  
 "We count our success in not only the number of people successfully complet-

ing the course but in the reduced number of second offenders," division director Eugene Hodges said. "Only nine per cent of those completing the course have ever been arrested again for driving while under the influence of alcohol."  
 Considering the serious consequences associated with drinking and driving, Hodges said the fact that the remaining 91 per cent haven't repeated the offense is significant. He said according to national statistics, only 50 per cent of all fatal accidents involve a drinking driver.  
 The clinics consist of films, lectures and class participation, all designed to change the drinking and driving behavior which led to the participant's conviction. The aim is to not only eliminate drinking and driving but to educate the person
