

Kerns retires

December will mark the retirement of Floyd D. Kerns from Farmers-Deposit Bank after 30 years of service. During Mr. Kerns' term as executive officer, the bank has grown from \$5,000,000 to more than \$27,000,000. Two new banks have been established. Mr. Kerns joined the bank in 1948 as Cashier and became a director in 1954. Prior to this he had been Secretary-Treasurer of the Eastern Kentucky Production Credit Association for a period of 11 years and Association Supervisor for the Production Credit Corporation of Louisville for 4 years. In 1964, Mr. Kerns was promoted to Vice President and in 1965 was elected Executive Vice President. He was elected resident in 1971.

Since coming to Flemingsburg in 1934, Mr. Kerns has been very active in community affairs, having served as President of the Lions Club, Deputy District Governor of Lions International, Chairman of World War II Bond Sales, member Agricultural Committee Kentucky Bankers Association and has taken an active interest in the Flemingsburg Christian Church where he now serves as a Deacon. Mr. Kerns is married to the former Janice Kennedy and they have two daughters, Mrs. William E. Hirschfeld, Washington, D. C. and Mrs. T. Scott Perkins, Flemingsburg, Kentucky. They have four grandchildren.

Mr. Kerns will remain on the Board of Directors of the bank and serve as a consultant for an indefinite period of time.

Since its modest beginning, the Lakewood grocery store has grown to many times its original size and has undergone numerous renovations and expansions.

In 1972 this leading establishment was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Orbin Sparks of Flemingsburg. Always, even in the days when she worked fulltime in the grocery store, Mildred Storey found time to help others.

She has long been a concerned, dedicated worker with the local Hospital Auxiliary, of which she is a past president. She has served on the Council on Volunteer Services and the Kentucky Hospital Auxiliary and, one day each week, she helps workers in and from the hospital's gift shop. Millie has worked for years on the Auxiliary's annual Bazaar project and has done many other things for the Auxiliary in a quiet way. She has been
