MSU Farm Tour at 6 p.m. tonight

Morehead State University is hosting a Farm Open House-Twilight Tour on Thursday, July 26, beginning at 6 p.m. Visitors will view various enterprises and projects at MSU's Darrington Agricultural Complex located on KY-377 including swine, beef cattle, poultry, horse program, greenhouses, vineyard, fruit orchard, flower gardens, vegetable gardens, turf plots and veterinary technology facility. The event is free and open to the public.

Officers issue 2,210 citations

State highway enforcement officers issued 2,210 citations in July, according to Department of Transportation figures. The figure shows a decline in citations from May in which 2,481 were issued.

Missing cab-drivers drew the largest number of citations with 776 violations cited. The cards, which must be kept in truck cabs at all times, show vehicle registration, permission to operate in a particular area, payment of the state fuel tax, bonding, size and weight of the truck, and proper liability insurance coverage.

Although June normally shows a heavier increase in citations, Col. Dick Horn, highway enforcement director, said the drop in citations last month is a result of assisting state police during the 10-day independent trucker's strike.

"Because of the trucker's strike, we weighed, checked and inspected fewer trucks," Horn said. "Our 78 field officers, as well as supervisors and technicians, were all active during the strike. Some escorted trucks or manned radios while others did routine patrolling duty."

Deadline for seeking deer dates is August 4

August 4 is the deadline to apply for certain deer hunts at Land Between the Lakes in western Kentucky.

Since the applications must be submitted by a computer drawing, those wishing to get their names in the pot should act now.

A note to Land Between the Lakes, Golden Pond, Ky. 42321 or a phone call (502) 924-5002, will get you the necessary application blanks of complete information.

Advance application is necessary for all gun hunting on LBL. For certain bow hunts and the special youth hunt. In past years, archers hunting during the regular bow season must register at LBL, but don't need to apply in advance.

Gun hunts will be conducted on the area Nov. 14, 17, 18, 20, 21, 24, 25, 28 and 29 for hunters deer only, unless otherwise stated on the permit. The bow hunts that require advance application will be on the same dates as the gun hunts. Archers will be confined to a certain area.

The youth hunt, scheduled for Nov. 17-18, is open to boys and girls at least 10 but under 16 years old who have valid hunter safety certificates. Each must be accompanied by an adult and must have a hunting license and a regular Kentucky deer permit. Either antlered or antlerless deer may be taken during the youth hunt and during all other hunts.

The only other federal installation requiring application will be in advance is Ft. Knox. Bow hunters may apply between Aug. 1 and Aug. 30 for the Oct. 6 through Nov. 11 bow season. Gun hunters must wait until Sept. 6 to send in their applications. Gun hunting permits will be accepted through Sept. 18. Gun hunting dates are Dec. 1, 2, 8 and 9. Up to five individuals may apply per letter at Ft. Knox. Letters of application must be accompanied by a \$10 fee for each hunter (certified checks or money orders only) payable to the Treasurer of the United States. Fees of those not chosen in the drawing will be returned. Application letters or requests for additional information should be sent to Ft. Knox Beautification and Conservation Committee, P.O. Box 1602, Ft. Knox, Ky. 40321, phone (502) 624-2311.

The reservation procedure at Ft. Campbell will be much the same as in past years. Reservations are required for weekend hunts. These reservations must be made the week before. For additional information on Ft. Campbell hunting, write the Recreation Services Division, Attention Outdoor Recreation Branch, Hunting and Fishing Unit, Ft. Campbell, Ky. 42223 or phone (502) 798-2175.

Another military installation popular with deer hunters, the Blue Gray Army Depot in Madison County, will have no deer hunts this year.
