Summer time is ice cream time. And since the cost of one little scoop is enough to make one think twice before parting with the cash, it makes ice cream to burn the hands on the ice creamer. Don't let anyone forget there is an unwritten law that whoever turns the ice creamer on at the dasher...

There are lots of good recipes for these in your freezer, either hand turned or electric. Try some of these:

- CHOCOLATE BANANA ICE CREAM
1 large tray banana
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon flour
1/4 cup cocoa
1/2 cup vanilla
1/2 cup heavy cream
1/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup cocoa
1/2 cup vanilla
1/2 cup heavy cream
1/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup cocoa
1/2 cup vanilla
1/2 cup heavy cream

- PEACH ICE CREAM
2 cups milk
2 cups sugar
1 tablespoon flour
1 egg yolk, slightly beaten
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup light cream
1/2 cup peach pulp
Combine all ingredients, and pour into double boiler, gradually add mixture of sugar, flour, and egg, stirring constantly.
Stir in small amounts of egg yolks, then mix in double boiler and cook 20 minutes, stirring constantly. Chill; add vanilla.

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Shaker Village ideal vacation destination

Imagine those wondrous spiritual dances culminated in fervent fervent dance, unbridled dancing and unrestrained. And if you are fortunate enough to be able to attend the Shaker Ballet (next performance — Sept. 13), your imagination will be shaken to one of its most vivid enjoyable climaxes. The performance embodies the Shaker existence, almost verbatim.

The village herb garden is particularly beautiful at midsummer time of year. Its blooms appearing bent upon heralding dashes of chaotic color onto an otherwise orderly scene. Shakers themselves probably have cherished any such outward appreciation of their brilliance, as these herbs were grown strictly for their healing properties. Having surveyed the garden, however, one fully realizes how much outward beauty was sprung from these herbs devoted to inward purposes.

While there was doubtless some 18-century superstition involved, it is true that these herbs became a significant second part of the Shaker life. The average life span for devotees was about 70 years, several years beyond life expectancy in the "outside world" during the period. A herbal physician developed and administered their own medicines, and during the height of work, they were given to the general public. Pleasant Hill family became one of the most industrious and inventive subcultures in American history.

Shaker Village has restored several buildings to provide accommodations for overnight guests. They are 66 rooms, separate reproduction furniture and handcrafted furnishings. Lodging costs range from \$17 to \$22 single, \$25-\$34 for double occupancy. Reservations are recommended. The dining room, located in the Trustees' House, serves food as good as any to be found in central Kentucky — and that is high commendation!

A country buffet breakfast is served from 8:30 to 9:30; it costs \$9.00. There are three seatings for lunch, from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Dinner is served at two seatings, 6:00 and 7:30 with a children's menu provided for those under 12. Adult prices are \$7.50-\$9.50.

Tours of the village are self-guided, but village "interpreters" are on hand in several buildings to assist with questions. The tours cost \$2.00 for adults, \$1.50 for students age 12 through high school, 75 cents for children 6-11. The village gift shop contains handmade Shaker furniture, pottery, hooked rugs, woolen goods, china, books and more.

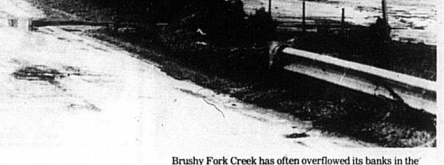

Store, prepare and Cook Meat

Plan your investment after a trip to care. Place foods that need to be refrigerated, such as meat, in the coldest part of the refrigerator or in the freezer compartment if your refrigerator has one. Fresh meat prepackaged may be stored in the original wrapping for two days in the refrigerator. Fresh vegetables should be stored unwrapped in the refrigerator crisper or wrapped in plastic on the lower shelf of the refrigerator.
