**Kay's Kitchen**

In a few days we will be celebrating July 4 and that is picnic time for many. So here are some helpful hints.  
The first rule is to keep hot food hot and cold food cold. This insures good health, and foods taste better.  
Pack food in a good cooler and keep it out of the sun. It is a good idea to thoroughly chill food in the refrigerator before packing it in your cooler.  
Keep cooked meat and poultry in the cooler. Cold fried chicken, cooked sausage, and luncheon meat are good picnic fare because they are less susceptible to poisoning than uncooked food.  
Wrap raw meats carefully, and chill before placing in your cooler. Better still freeze the meat so it can help keep the meat cool.  
Ingredients for salads and sandwiches, especially if they contain mayonnaise or salad dressing, should be packed in separate containers in the cooler, then assembled at picnic site.  
Food that must be prepared at home like potato salad and coleslaw, will stay at a low temperature if packed in several smaller packages than one large one. Then too they may be served from the small cartons. Keep other packages chilled until used to avoid Return any leftover food immedi-
