Kay's Kitchen

One of the many delights of summer is to be able to serve salads. I like them all. Vegetable, conserved, fruit, and combinations. If you don't want to make a meal of the salad, they certainly can add a lot, even to taking the place of a vegetable. I will start in this week giving some recipes for salads that will be the main part of the meal.

MOILED FISH SALAD
Salmon Layer:
1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin (1 envelope)
1/2 cup cold water
1/2 cup boiling water
2 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice
1 1/2 pound can salmon (or 2 cans solid-park tuna, drained and flaked)
Combine gelatin and salt and add cold water; let stand 5 minutes. Add gelatin mixture to boiling water and stir until clear. Cool. Blend in lemon juice and salt. Pour into fish mold or 9 X 5 X 3 inch loafpan that has been greased in cold water. Chill until set while preparing Cheese Layer.

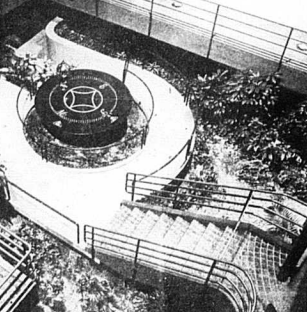
SHRIMP SALAD
(3 1/2-cups) can shrimp
1 cup finely chopped celery
2 cups cooked rice
1/2 cup chopped parsley
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup mayonnaise
2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
1 teaspoon curry powder, optional
If you don't use the curry, try grated onion to taste.
Drain and rinse shrimp, dry on paper toweling. Combine shrimp, rice, celery, parsley, and onion. Combine mayonnaise, French dressing, lemon juice, and curry, if onion. Add mayonnaise mixture to shrimp mixture; toss. Serve on salad greens or your choice. Bibb lettuce or spinach is a nice change. This is a good way to use canned shrimp which is much cheaper than fresh. It freezes alright and makes a good salad for seafood lovers.

CORNEB BEEF SALAD
1 can corneb beef
1 can beef consommé
1 1/2 ounce package lemon gelatin
3 hard cooked eggs, chopped
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1 tablespoon freshly squeezed lemon juice
1/2 cup diced onion
1/2 cup diced celery
1 cup corned beef
Chop corneb beef. Heat consommé and add to gelatin. Stir until dissolved. Cool until slightly thickened. Add vegetables, eggs and meat. Stir in mayonnaise, onion and corn. Press into 8-inch square pan. Chill until set. Serve on lettuce, with additional mayonnaise.
Crackers and cheese go well with this salad.

Take the law into your hands in Small Claims Court

If you are unable to settle a consumer complaint, then take the law into your own hands and sue in the Small Claims Division of District Court.

The Kentucky Small Claims Court became effective Jan. 2, 1978. It will assist consumers and businesses in settling disputes of \$500 or less.

The Small Claims Division was designed so that consumers or businesses with claims of \$500 or less can file a claim or defend themselves without the assistance of an attorney. However, you may employ an attorney to handle your case if you desire.

The procedures used in the Small Claims Division are simple and informal. The two parties involved in the dispute go to court at the designated time and tell their sides of the disagreement to the judge. The judge listens to each side, then makes a decision based on the law governing the facts presented. No juries are used in the Small Claims Division.

To file a claim in the Small Claims Division follow these steps:
1) Go to the office of the circuit court clerk in the county where the defendant lives or does business. If the dispute arose from a sale which was made in your home, you can sue in the county in which you live.
2) Complete the Small Claims Complaint Form which the clerk will provide. You will need to provide the following information:
a. Your name and address, and the defendant's name and address;
b. A short, simple statement telling why you are suing;
c. The amount of money you are suing for.
The clerk will assign the case a number and set a date and time for the hearing before the judge. The hearing will be held within three to six weeks after the clerk notifies the defendant of your suit.
4) The clerk will send a copy of your complaint to the defendant by certified or registered mail. If the clerk cannot reach the defendant by mail, then you must have the sheriff's office personally deliver a copy of your complaint to the defendant.

There is a \$10 filing fee for bringing a claim in the Small Claims Division. This does not include the cost of sending a copy of your complaint to the defendant by certified or registered mail, or sheriff's fees if the defendant cannot be reached by mail. However, if you win the case the defendant can be charged for these court costs.

If you receive notice, you are being sued in the Small Claims division, do not fail to appear at the hearing. A default judgment can be rendered against you if you fail to appear or if you are not granted a continuance by the court.

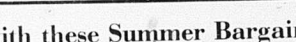
To prepare for your appearance at the Small Claims hearing, collect all

evidence in support of your position, including contracts, letters, sales receipts, damaged goods or pictures. Bring any witnesses you wish to call on your behalf.

Present only those facts involved in your case in a concise and organized manner. You may want to visit the court and watch a hearing before your own hearing date to better understand this court's procedure.

The Small Claims Division of District Court is an efficient and inexpensive way of settling consumer complaints if your claim is \$500 or less. You are permitted to bring 25 claims per year. You must be 18 years of age or older, or represented by a parent or legal guardian, to file a complaint.

You can obtain a free brochure prepared by the Attorney General's office on "How to Use the Small Claims Division of the District Court," from your local circuit court clerk, or by calling the toll free consumer hotline at 1-800-272-2960. If you have a consumer problem you feel does not immediately merit legal action and you would like to attempt to resolve it, send your written complaint to the Office of the Attorney General, Consumer Protection Division, 209 St. Clair Street, Frankfort, KY 40601.
