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**ASCS now accepting applications**

The Nicholas County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), began accepting applications for the 1979 wheat and feed grain program on Feb. 15. Cliff Wice, chairman of the ASCS committee, said participation thus far has been light, but greater activity is expected during the next few weeks.

Program participation is voluntary. However, farmers with no-aside crops of barley, corn, grain sorghum, or wheat must file their intentions to participate during the signup period to be eligible for deficiency and disaster payment protection for these crops, as well as rice and upland cotton, and be eligible for price support loans on all crops except sugar.

**Older Worker Week observed**  
The state of Kentucky is observing "National Employ the Older Worker Week" from March 11-17.  
Statistics show that more than 78 million Americans are more than 65 years old and half this number are seeking work. It has been estimated that two of every five American workers, or 40.7 per cent of the work force, is 40 or older.

During this week Kentucky Department for Human Resources field offices will be concentrating job placement efforts in this age group.  
The Lexington DHR office noted during the first three months of fiscal 1979 it had 1,510 active applications on file from persons 40 or older and that only 24 were placed during the same period.

**Food stamp changes**

All Kentuckians who have applied for food stamps since March 1, 1978 are now eligible to recover food stamp benefits which may have been denied them because of administrative errors, officials of the Department for Human Resources announced today.  
Because of a recent change in federal law, retroactive benefits are available to households no longer receiving food stamps, as well as current food stamp recipients. Previously, only families active in the food stamp program were eligible.  
Gail Huecker, commissioner of the department's Bureau for Social Insurance, said payment of denied benefits applies to cases in which administrative errors resulted in denial of food stamp benefits and cases in which such errors reduced the amount of food stamps a household could receive.  
Eligibility records of households now receiving food stamps are reviewed regularly, Huecker said. "Errors will be corrected as they are found, and retroactive adjustments will be made," she said.  
Huecker said persons no longer receiving food stamps should contact their local Department for Human Resources food stamp office before Oct. 31 if they believe they were denied full benefits because of administrative error.  
Families may choose to receive their retroactive food stamp allotments in a lump sum or gradually over several months.

"All producers planting wheat and/or feed grains for harvest in 1979 on farms with a normal crop acreage not eligible to participate." Vice said.  
Participating farmers agree to take out of production one acre for every 10 planted in 1979 to corn and sorghum and two acres for every 10 planted to wheat and barley for grain. Corn and grain sorghum voluntary diversion payments may be earned when farmers sign up to take an additional acre out of production for every 10 acres planted.  
Farmers who may be undecided about the program or have questions are encouraged to contact the ASCS office or one of the ASC committee persons for more information.

**Seedlings available**  
Landowners can now make applications for cost-share funds to aid them in improving their forestland and also to plant trees. Information regarding cost-share assistance is available through the local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office.  
The Kentucky Division of Forestry operates three nurseries where low-

cost tree seedlings are grown and distributed to the state's farmers and timberland owners. Where possible, the Division of Forestry will transport the trees to a central point in each county where buyers can receive them.  
Tree seedlings available are: Loblolly Pine, Shortleaf Pine, White Pine, Virginia Pine, Scotch Pine, Black Locust, White Ash, Cottonwood, Sycamore, Yellow Poplar, Black Walnut, White Oak, Chinese Chestnut, Black Alder, and Autumn Olive. The seedlings come in bundles of 100's, 500's, or

1,000's. The Kentucky Division of Forestry office which works Nicholas County farmers is located at 710 West First Street, Morehead, 40351, phone (606) 784-7504.  
The spring seedling date for tree seedlings in March 15-April 15. Information concerning other species of seedlings and cuttings can be obtained from the local District Forester office listed above. Order blanks and price lists for seedlings are available through the ASCS office, or by contacting the Division of Forestry.
