### 'Sweet Sixteen' returns to Lexington in a new arena

If you are planning on being in Lexington March 14-17 for the Boys State High School Basketball Tournament, and you haven't been to the "Heart of the Bluegrass", here are some helpful hints.

The tournament, which returns to Lexington for the first time since 1964, will be held in spacious Rupp Arena in Lexington Center, with more than 23,000 seats for basketball, concert and other special events.

Lexington Center is situated at the west end of downtown Lexington on the corner of Vine Street and Broadway. The complex houses a Hyatt Regency Hotel, a mall which contains over 50 stores, ballrooms, ticket offices and seats to lounge around on your spare time.

Elevators and escalators are located in the mall for one's convenience between the first and third floors.

Parking is available throughout the downtown area within walking distance of the center. A lot at the High Street level serves as the Lexington Center's main parking area. Just beyond this lot on Manchester Street is located another lot. This area is one block from the center. These parking areas contain numerous spaces for the handicapped.

Also there are approximately 3,500 spaces available for parking, including a small lot adjacent to the front entrance.

The four-day tournament, known as the "Sweet Sixteen", for the 16 regions of Kentucky, has been tabbed as the largest single event in Lexington since the advent of the World Three-Day Event", according to Lexington Center Executive Director Tom Minter. "This is in terms of the number of activities it will generate, the number of people attracted and the length of their stay."

Afternoon sessions of the tournament will be played on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday with the first game beginning at 12 p.m. A second game will follow at 2:30 p.m. The night session will get under way at 7:30 p.m. with the second game beginning at 9 p.m.

Saturday's semi-final action is slated for 10:00 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. The championship game will be played at 10:00 Saturday night.

Tickets are still available for the tournament and may be obtained from the Lexington Center Ticket Office, located just off High Street. Tickets are \$4 for the individual season or \$22 for the entire tournament. No personal checks are accepted; only cash or money orders. For more information concerning the tickets, call (606) 225-2665.

This year's Sweet 16, with opponents and the seasons in which they play their first game, are: Wednesday afternoon—Palauki County vs. Hazard and Warren East vs. Owensboro and Harrison County vs. Mayfield. Thursday evening—Clay County vs. Cave Run and Grant County vs. Laffayette. Thursday afternoon—Ashland vs. County.
