

Personal income growth third in nation



Kentucky's personal income growth between January 1978 and January 1979 ranks third among the states, a copyrighted report in the current state of Business Week shows.

Personal income in Kentucky rises up by 30.2 per cent in January as compared to the same month a year ago. In the nation, personal income went from \$12 billion to \$15.9 billion, an increase of 44.3 per cent. Kentucky income went from \$1.75 billion to \$2.1 billion during that period.

The only states ranking ahead of Kentucky were Arizona, with a 22.8 per cent increase, and Alabama, with 21.8 per cent. The District of Columbia was also higher, with an increase of 22.4 per cent.

William Short, secretary of the Kentucky Development Cabinet, said the figures reflect a continuing trend of more rapid personal income growth in Kentucky than in the nation as a whole. The state's economic growth is also evident from statistics showing greater business activity in Louisville, Kentucky's largest city, than in most other metropolitan areas across the nation, he noted.

Figures from the U. S. Department of Commerce show department store sales are up by 22.1 per cent in Louisville, compared to a U. S. average increase of 8.1 per cent. Construction activity there has increased 14.9 per cent, compared to a national increase of 11.3 per cent, the figures show.

Viet vets report trouble adjusting

Almost half of the veterans disabled in Vietnam Era military service have experienced readjustment problems according to a recent Veterans Administration survey.

Responding to a question from Rep. Robert W. Edgar during recent hearings before the House Committee on Veterans Affairs, chaired by Rep. Ray Roberts, Va. chief Max Cleland revealed that VA has completed an extensive survey among veterans in a questionnaire.

Rep. Edgar, of Pennsylvania, questioned Cleland about a VA request for authority to broaden its psychological counseling among Vietnam veterans and their families. VA has requested \$10 million for the program during fiscal year 1980.

Cleland said the survey shows that 45 per cent of the veterans surveyed answered "yes" to the question, "Since leaving the active Army Forces, have you experienced readjustment problems?"

Of those who said "yes," half characterized their problems as being with family or friends. Ability to work with fellow employees was a problem for 25 per cent; making plans for the future frustrated 23 per cent; coping with alcohol or drug abuse problems, 24 per cent; and severe depression had been experienced by 6.5 per cent.

VA has asked Congress for broader authority to treat these problems in community settings and to treat family members whose mental health affects an eligible veteran.
