

Carroll signs school rules

Gov. Julian Carroll has signed an executive order establishing regulations for the Kentucky School Building Authority, thus freeing allocations for 10 districts approved by the authority contingent on the regulations.

The governor signed the emergency regulations so the normal approval period for the regulations would not unnecessarily delay construction starts and thus drive up costs.

The action frees funds for 10 projects authorized by the Authority at its April meeting. It is expected the Authority will approve several others at its meeting tomorrow.

The 10 projects already authorized are:

1. Williamsburg Independent — a new facility to serve kindergarten through twelfth grade, total cost \$2,730,150. The state will assist at 53 percent, or \$1,445,579.
2. Woodford County — a new elementary school, total cost \$2,330,000. The state will assist at 30 percent, or \$705,000.
3. Bourbon County — an addition to the high school, total cost \$1,570,000. The state will assist at 30 percent, or \$471,000.
4. Logan County — a new high school, total cost \$4,300,000. The state will assist at 49 percent, or \$2,107,000.
5. Silver Grove Independent — a new high school, total cost \$655,000. The state will assist at 45 percent, or \$294,750.
6. Harlan Independent — a new elementary school, total cost \$1,890,000.

The state will assist at 61 percent, or \$1,153,900.

7. Bullitt County — a new high school, total cost \$5,400,000. The state will assist at 54 percent, or \$2,916,000.

8. Graves County — an elementary school addition, total cost \$469,720. The state will assist at 46 percent, or \$215,611.

9. Powell County — elementary school addition, total cost \$1,245,120. The state will assist at 57 percent, or \$708,718.

10. Mason County — a new elementary school, total cost \$3,780,000. The state will assist at 43 percent, or \$1,625,400.

The School Building Authority, established by the 1978 General Assembly, grew out of the Governor's Task Force on Education. It provides re-

sources for school building based on complex formulas involving need and local effort.

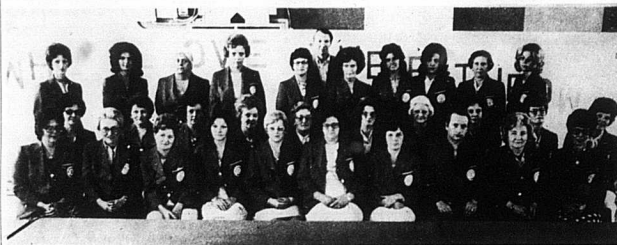

'51 Recognized'

Thoroughbred Day, May 11, 1979, will be remembered as a special day by the Blue Grass Industries Thoroughbred Club. That day the largest group of Thoroughbreds ever, 51, were recognized.

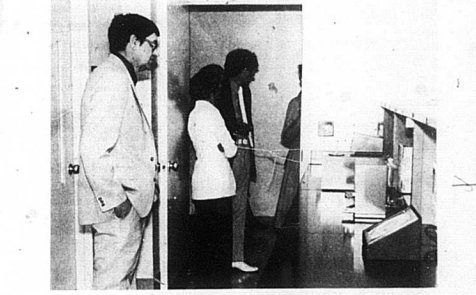

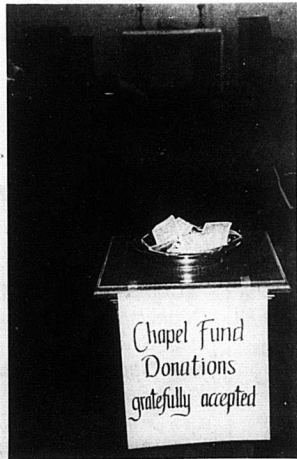
