

Kay's Kitchen

In answering the requests for dessert recipes last week I forgot the Memorial Day weekend usual picnic cubes. Oh well, I may have been the first picnic of the season, but certainly not the last. So along the line somewhere I will have picnic foods.

Surly by this time we are all ready for good summertime food. Fresh vegetables and fruit should begin to be plentiful and hopefully a little less expensive. Even I have a few spring onions in my flower garden. Enough to give us a treat and cook a few in boiling water until tender. Season with salt and butter. When cutting the onions into about one inch pieces, use some of the green, up to about where the tops begin to separate. If you are growing in the garden be sure to cut some when it is really tender for Spinach Salad. Nothing special, but that except use it instead of lettuce, then your favorite additions and dressing.



Most of us are enjoying the fresh garden lettuce. I am, thanks to my friend. You may eat it as is, or make Willett Lettuce, which is simply a combination of lettuce, water, sugar, little bit of flour and bacon grease heated over the lettuce. Or simply course the amount of the ingredients depends on how much you want to serve. You mix it out with using a half cup each of water and vinegar, pour into one tablespoon butter, drizzings, and one teaspoon flour. Heat in skillet and pour over a nice bowl of lettuce.

A bacon and lettuce sandwich is delicious when made with fresh garden lettuce, and homemade mayonnaise. If that do you a good recipe of mayonnaise, not salad cream.

As the beta come up and are big enough to eat, don't throw away the tops. They are delicious cooked as greens. A nice combination is spinach and tender beet tops. Mint beds should be growing well now. Mine started out in good shape for Derby weekend, so have been letting mine rest for a couple of weeks. Now it is ready to use as greens and should be strong all summer.

When making ice tea, put two to three quarts of water in the pitcher with the tea and pour the boiling water over it, including sugar. However, if using an artificial sweetener do not add until tea has cooled. It will give a too sweet, bitter taste if heated. This is also true if you want to add it to fruits requiring a lot of sugar, like rhubarb or very tart apples. Add the liquid sweetener after cooking.

And speaking of rhubarb. A bowl of freshly cooked rhubarb is delicious to serve as a fruit or make your favorite shortbread and serve Elizabeth Shortcake, topped with whipped topping. Here is a refreshing tip for serving the old standby, carrots.

MINTED CARROTS
5 or 6 carrots
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
About one third teaspoon salt, to taste
2 teaspoons finely chopped mint
Fare carrots, slice very thin. Cook in boiling water, covered, until just tender to taste. Drain and add butter. Add butter and salt and heat until butter is melted. Add mint, mix well and pour over carrots. Slice and serve hot.

There are lots of recipes calling for dried mint flakes, remember this if you are lucky enough to have fresh mint. Two teaspoons of fresh mint finely chopped or 1/4 teaspoon dried mint.

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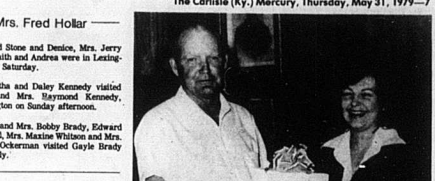

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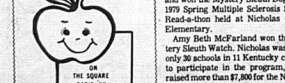
