If elected next Tuesday, I will again work toward obtaining a completed city audit the first of each year as I did during the 1976-77 term when I served as council member.

Other projects that I supported then will again be of concern, for me in trying to get them implemented. These include:

- Hire a 24-hour police radio and telephone operation.
- Upgrade the police department by sending each policeman to the Eastern Kentucky University law enforcement school.
- Upgrade the gas, water and sewer systems.
- Reorganize the fire department so it can qualify for federal funds.
- Obtain higher wages for city employees.
- Installation of a switch on Main Street to control all stoplights so traffic can be regulated during times of heavy traffic flow.
- I am against a payroll tax, but do believe in enforcing the city auto sticker laws we now have. I am also for enforcing parking meter regulations. If this is not to be done, then we should remove the meters and have two-hour parking on city streets. I am against any extension of city boundaries until the area in question is studied and determinations are made concerning the financial liabilities the city would have to bear.

My accomplishments as council member during 1976-77 prove that I am not just a talker. Some of them were worked with the city in getting an eight-inch gas line to Blue Grass knitting with the help of Blue Grass Industries, Inc. and the Nicholas County Fiscal Court; worked to see and get about every street in Berea with blue-striped suggested city provide policemen to direct traffic at the busy school intersection, and suggested and helped obtain better insurance for city employees. I also helped reevaluate the planning and zoning commission during its last term and will continue to support it.

I would like the opportunity to serve the people of Carlisle once again, and any city resident may call me for help any or night.
