Kay's Kitchen

For the next few weeks I will be giving recipes for "party foods" since I have had more requests for those recipes than any other for the holidays. They are a collection I have saved throughout the year. Some I have tried, others I have not, but they sounded good to me, so I clipped them to pass on to you. I'm sure before the holidays are over I will try them too.

QUICK CANAPES
Day-old or firm bread, trimmed of crust
1/2 cup butter or margarine
Shape bread with cookie cutter. Cream butter with anchovy fillets or paste, chili, chutney, Parmesan cheese, chopped shrimp, onion, or any favorite cheese, fish or condiment. Spread on bread. Media, eye, onion, garlic or other flavored toast rounds can be used.

HOT BROCCOLI DIP
2 1/2-ounce boxes frozen, chopped broccoli
1 large onion, finely chopped
2 ribs celery, finely chopped
1/4 ounce can mushrooms, drained and chopped
6 tablespoons butter or margarine
1/2-ounce can water chestnuts, chopped
2 6-ounce packages pasteurized processed cheese, sliced
2 11-ounce cans condensed cream of mushroom soup
1 1/2-ounce can evaporated milk
2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
Prepare broccoli according to package directions. Drain well. Saute onion, celery and mushrooms in butter until tender. Add water chestnuts. Melt garlic cheese in unadulterated soup in a large double boiler. Add drained broccoli, onion celery mixture, evaporated milk and Worcestershire sauce. Cook, stirring, for about 5 minutes.

CURRIED AND/OR BILED HENNOCK EGGS
Boil at least one egg per guest expected. Peel and cut into halves. Remove yolks and divide into two separate bowls. Mash well. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt to moisten yolks and make them smooth. Add a teaspoon Dijon or spicy brown mustard per four eggs to each mixture. For the dill stuffing, add 1/2 teaspoon crushed dill weed per four eggs. For curry, add 1/2 teaspoon (or more to taste) per four eggs. Salt to taste. Mix well, cover with plastic wrap and allow to melt in refrigerator overnight. (The whites will keep well chilled. Drain well with paper covered in cold water.) To serve, stuff eggs and decorate the whites with a slice of ripe olive, or the dilled ones with a slice of green olive.

Reynolds, Rainey attend SS meet

Sam Reynolds of Carlisle, elected delegate, represented local Southern States Cooperative members at the association's 56th Annual Stockholders' meeting held in Billerica, Va., November 13 and 14. Also attending the session was Mrs. Sue Rainey, manager, representing Southern States Carlisle Cooperative. They heard Executive vice president and general manager, John J. Feland report that Southern States had topped the half-billion dollar mark in business volume for the first time in its 56 year history. Total for the year ended June 30 was \$508.6 million compared with \$479.3 million a year earlier. Over half of the \$129.3 million increase—\$74 million—was due to the first full year's operation of the Grain Marketing division, Feland said. He attributed about half of the remaining approximately \$55 million increase to inflation. Net earnings after income taxes and including undistributed equity increase in associated companies came to \$12.3 million, compared with \$7.8 million a year earlier.
