Kay's Kitchen

Since it's time to cook and enjoy good food the little extras all seem worthwhile to me. However I do realize there are a lot of people who just can't get excited over a new recipe or planning a dinner. If you are in this category perhaps the recipes this week will appeal to you or remind you to use them if you have served them before.

MEAT CASSEROLE
This recipe is to serve four. If your family is larger, use number of chops necessary and increase other ingredients proportionally.
1 medium rib rack pork chops
1 tablespoon raw rice
1 bouillon cube, dissolved in 1 cup boiling water
1/2 teaspoon margarine
1/2 teaspoon thyme
1 large onion
2 ripe tomatoes or 1 No. 303 can whole tomatoes, drained
1 large onion
2 tablespoons of fat
Brown chops in the fat in a skillet. Put rice in bottom of greased casserole. Put the chops on the rice and top each with an slice of onion, tomato and green pepper, seasoning as you go. Add margarine and thyme to bouillon and skewer or string. Thicken gravy and serve.

Chop onions fine, add minced onion, bread crumbs, mushrooms, egg and seasoning. Mix well. Add hot liquid to make moist enough to spread evenly over steak. Roll each piece of steak and skewer or tie to be securely. Sear quickly in frying pan in hot margarine. Place in casserole and add 1/2 cup hot liquid. Cover and cook at 325 degrees for approximately 1 1/2 to 2 hours. When done place on hot platter, remove skewer or string. Thicken gravy and serve.

BAKED BEEF SLICES
This is so simple and easy its ridiculous and just goes to show you don't have to spend a lot of time to have something good. Joanne W. Conley told me about this and it has been one of my favorite dishes.
Place two center cut slices of ham in a casserole. Open a No. 303 can of fruit cocktail and pour over ham. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees.

STUFFED STEAK
1 round steak, about 1/2 inch thick
1 medium onion
1/2 cup minced onion
2 cups stale bread crumbs
1 egg
1 teaspoon sage
1/2 teaspoon fresh ground pepper
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup water and mushroom juice
Salt steak into two pieces (half if it is crosswise not lengthwise).
Chop onions fine, add minced onion, bread crumbs, mushrooms, egg and seasoning. Mix well. Add hot liquid to make moist enough to spread evenly over steak. Roll each piece of steak and skewer or tie to be securely. Sear quickly in frying pan in hot margarine. Place in casserole and add 1/2 cup hot liquid. Cover and cook at 325 degrees for approximately 1 1/2 to 2 hours. When done place on hot platter, remove skewer or string. Thicken gravy and serve.

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What historic survey looks for in Nicholas

Editor's Note: Because it may not have been possible for every interested person to attend the public meeting on October 4, The Carlisle Mercury has asked Camille Wells to describe the procedures and intentions of the historic buildings survey that she is currently conducting in Nicholas County. As the survey is only in its third week, the illustrations for this explanation were taken from the completed survey of adjacent Fleming County.

The Kentucky Heritage Commission has recently begun a survey of old buildings in Carlisle and Nicholas County as part of a joint federal and state-funded effort to record the cultural resources of Kentucky on a county by county basis. The varied list of notable old structures that is the result of this Nicholas County survey will be the foundation of other Heritage Commission programs: many of the recorded buildings will be listed on the official Kentucky Survey of Historic Buildings and a quantity of them will receive Landmark Certifications. In addition to these state-administered processes, the number of buildings will eventually be nominated to the National Register of Historic Places. Important as these forms of recognition are, it is the major function of the historic buildings survey to provide a sound and complete record

of the structures of Nicholas County. Old buildings are being destroyed or allowed to deteriorate at an alarming rate. As this happens, the traditions, practices, techniques, and fashions that the structures embody is permanently lost. Because it would be impossible to preserve every old building in Kentucky, the next best effort is to get a good record of the buildings. The survey is an attempt to document, with photographs, drawings, descriptions, interviews, and research, all of the historic structures in Carlisle and Nicholas County. The survey of Nicholas County began with some basic research, including a reading of the invaluable History of Nicholas County. A second study of the book, with other forms of detailed and specific research, will be done after the actual fieldwork has been completed. Using large scaled topographic maps of the rural areas and a detailed city map of Carlisle, the surveyor will travel the roads or walked. In this way, even hidden structures can be viewed and evaluated. When a surveyable building is located, it is marked and numbered on the map. The surveyor interviews the resident of the site about the history of the structure, including questions about when it was built, how it has been used, and who has owned it in the past.



Shown above are two examples of the type of structures the Kentucky Heritage Commission is interested in seeing during its survey of Carlisle and Nicholas County historic sites. It might be interesting to note that houses do not have to be 200 years old and in perfect condition to merit attention. What the survey looks for is types of architecture and structures that typify certain periods in the county's history. Both these examples are from the recently published Fleming County survey of historic sites. One is the Kerner-Plummer house, built in Flemingsburg. The other is an early house that was constructed in the shingle style popular at that time. Designed by the Cincinnati firm of Peck and Williamson, it is considered one of the handsomest houses in Flemingsburg. The other is an early house that has been endangered by neglect and misuse. This important link to Kentucky's history is being lost forever, not because the structure was faulty but because it apparently outlived its usefulness and was not adapted to changing times. Both structures are historically important and figures of Kentucky survey.
