jails said jail problems in Kentucky including understaffed pay, care and facilities can be attributed to a lack of money. The district jail system recommended by the task force would replace county jails with state operated district jails serving multi-county areas. The district jails would be supplemented by temporary holdover jails.

Legislators Seek Help for Emergency Ambulance Services
A legislative committee has asked Kentucky's congressional delegation to seek a waiver from federal require-

ments so that counties can continue to provide emergency ambulance service. The federal government wants counties to terminate many employees paid with CETA funds by October 1. County Judge-Executives from around the state came to Frankfort to appeal to legislators to seek an exemption from the federal requirements because many of the emergency ambulance employees are paid with CETA money and termination of these employees would adversely affect ambulance service in many counties.
