The formal 60-day Resource Conservation Act (RCA) public review period was tentatively scheduled to begin November 13, 1979 and end on January 14, 1980. However, the Federal Register has permitted a copy of Draft Appraisal Part I to be available for early public review in S.C.S. field office beginning September 4, 1979.
One copy of the Draft Appraisal-Part I is now available for public review in the Soil Conservation Service office located in the basement of the post office at Carlisle. Anyone desiring to review or discuss this draft may do so. The S.C.S. office is open from 8 to 5 Monday through Friday.
The public may submit comments on Draft Appraisal-Part I, at any time before the end of the official review period tentatively scheduled for January 14, 1980. Public comments are to be sent directly to the R.C.A. Response Analysis Center, U.S.D.A., Soil Conservation Service, Box 888, Athens, Georgia 30602.
We will not have local county level meetings on the Appraisal-Part I, but there will be 18 regional meetings held throughout the United States and one of these meetings will be held in Lexington, Ky., to be announced at a later date on time and place.

Replace property tax?

Subcommittee to study alternate education funding

Members of the Subcommittee on Education and the Arts voted unanimously last week recommended to the Interim Joint Committee on Education that a special seven-member subcommittee be set up to study alternate tax sources for local school districts.
The alternate source would be sought to replace property tax as the major source of revenue for local school districts. The subcommittee would determine alternate taxes which would not be subject to as much controversy and would be easier to administer than are the current property taxes.
In its resolution, the subcommittee noted the amount of property tax revenue available to the school districts has steadily declined over the years.
Education and the Arts subcommittee chairman, Rep. Buel Goy (D-Scottsville) said that the new subcom-

mittee would be established to gather citizens input as well as to study alternative tax sources.
After hearing from witnesses about the weighted pupil unit system, the subcommittee approved a motion to recommend to the Interim Committee on Education, which met later, that legislation be prepared providing for as many as 10 pilot school districts which would be funded on the weighted pupil unit system.
The weighted pupil unit system, currently in use in several states, bases financial support for elementary and secondary education upon the individual pupil participating in a particular program rather than upon the number of classrooms.
The pilot projects would allow the General Assembly to acquire better data on establishing financial accounting systems and to more accurately set up this system and which any statewide systems would be based.
Jim Melton, executive director of the Kentucky School Board Association, told the subcommittee that "properly developed, the weighted pupil unit system could equalize educational aid across the state," but that the system needs a large amount of study before it could be enacted.
Bob Summers, executive secretary of

the Kentucky Education Association, told committee members that the results of a questionnaire sent to executive secretaries of 13 education associations in states using the weighted pupil method showed the system "generally causes more state control," but additional control, according to Summers's respondents, causes state departments of education to become less service-oriented and more regulatory and monitoring-oriented agencies.
Summers said that the Kentucky Education Association Board of Directors is on record as not supporting weighted pupil unit unless accompanied by assurances and penalties as to the size and ratio of pupils to teachers.
In other action, the subcommittee decided to take no action on an LIRC bill draft to void non-public teaching experience toward teacher retirement benefits.
The proposed bill would allow teachers to receive credit for private school service in Kentucky is not recognized in compiling the retirement benefits of teachers under the Kentucky Teacher's Retirement System.
The subcommittee recommended a motion be sent to Sen. Gene Stuart (R-Prospect) pointing out concerns of constitutionality and financial impact on the retirement systems and suggesting that he ask for an attorney general's opinion on its constitutionality.
The subcommittee also passed a resolution calling for a letter to be sent to the Superintendent of Public Instruction Dr. James B. Graham asking for response from him or the state board on the issue of certification for school nurses.

A special committee established by the Department of Education recommended to Dr. Graham that certification for school nurses should be made available with the provisions that no local school district can be kept from hiring a non-certified nurse.
The next meeting of subcommittee is scheduled for 10 a.m. Oct. 3 in Room 307 of the Capitol.
