NCHS students may take tests

Brenda Anderson, guidance director at Nicholas County High, has announced that sophomores, juniors, and some seniors will be able to join over one million other students around the world in taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) this fall. The test, cosponsored by the

College Board and National Merit Scholarship Corporation, is an important step in making college plans. Scheduled for October 23, at Nicholas County High, the PSAT/NMSQT measures verbal and mathematical aptitude — two abilities important in doing college work — and gives students a chance to find out what the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) is like.

By taking the PSAT/NMSQT, students can enter the competition for scholarships administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and ask to participate in the College Board's Student Search Service, which gives students an opportunity to hear from colleges that they might not otherwise know about.

With their score reports, students receive a copy of ABOUT YOUR PSAT/NMSQT SCORES, a booklet that contains valuable how-to information about estimating SAT scores, finding out where to get and how to use detailed information about colleges and financing a college education.

In addition, students can use the College Board's The College Handbook, 1979-80 to compare their scores with those of enrolled students at more than 2,400 colleges and universities.

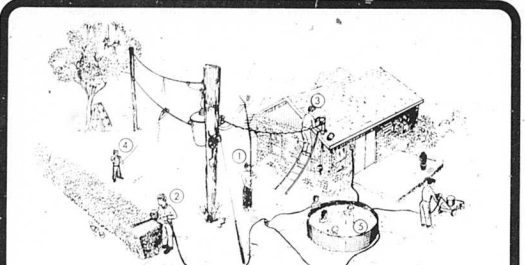
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These people are making serious safety mistakes. Can you find them?

Gas cost rises 3 cents in month

The average cost of gasoline in central and eastern Kentucky has increased three cents a gallon at full-service stations and decreased a half cent at self-service since August 27. These figures were released this week in the Blue Grass Automobile Club's (AAA) fuel gauge report.

The average cost at full-service pumps is 99.3 cents for regular; \$1.04 for premium; \$1.07 for no-lead, and \$1.02 for diesel. Self-service prices are 92.6 cents for regular; 98.4 cents for premium and 96.4 cents for no-lead.

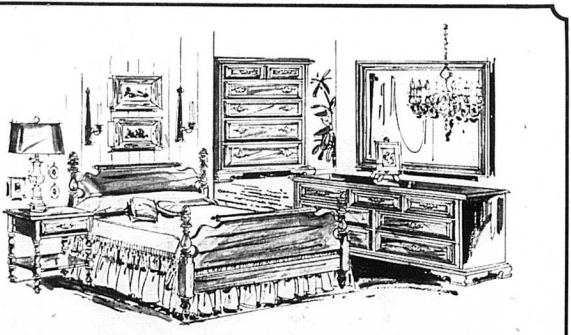
