Cynthiana plans burley festival

A three-day Burley Festival will be held on October 4, 5, and 6 in Cynthiana sponsored by the Downtown Merchants Association.

Flood group plans report
The Governor's Task Force met recently in Frankfort to review recommendations on flood cause and prevention.

Among recommendations discussed were proposals to:
— create a central agency to oversee all flood-related programs and projects or to reactivate the already existing Water Resources Authority to coordinate flood efforts.
— direct the state to advocate federal and state income tax deductions for people who "flood proof" existing structures in the flood plain.
— recommend that the National Weather Service increase its staffing to better predict floods.
— develop legislation so communities can take on long-term flood damage reduction projects. State law prevents local governments from committing funds beyond the current fiscal year.
A final set of recommendations from the task force must be presented to Gov. Julian Carroll by Oct. 1.
