THE TAX REFORM ACT OF 1976 EXTENDS THE INVESTMENT TAX CREDIT AT THE 10% RATE, RIGHT?

Yes, the 10% credit for qualified assets is extended through December 31, 1980 when, that, unless the law is changed in the meantime, it drops back to the old rate of 7%.

HOW DOES THE INVESTMENT CREDIT SAVE ME MONEY?

Each dollar of investment credit saves you a dollar on your Federal income tax. For example, suppose your income tax liability for the year (not taking the investment credit into account) is \$5,000. If you have bought \$30,000 of assets that qualify for the maximum investment credit, the 10% credit comes to \$3,000. This reduces your tax liability from \$5,000 to \$2,000.

Note that unlike a tax deduction, which merely reduces your taxable income, the investment credit is subtracted dollar for dollar directly from your tax payment.

There's a big hunk of Kentucky stretching from General Butler in Carrollton to Carter Caves in Greenup County that is devoid of any such development. And it's hurting organizations in this area.

For example, Maysville Community College is hosting representatives from the state's other community colleges in the near future. But because of the lack of a meeting place in this area the group is being forced to meet in northern Kentucky.

That may have been why everybody but the junior was there at the meeting from the Mason County Courthouse. It makes good sense to people in this area to put an overnight lodging place in the middle of a stretch of national highway that measures 50 miles without a single motel.

Nicholas Countians have always said that if a lodge is built they will do it. In fact, in the last few weeks the lodge will begin again and most of the hunters will stay in Mt. Sterling or Paris because they can't get rooms any closer. That's just one example of what the lack of a motel in this area is doing. It seems to us that if the state wanted a good business proposition, and one that could contribute financially to further development at the park, it would take a good, hard look at Blue Licks in the next General Assembly.

There were batches of resolutions submitted to the tax force last Wednesday that the best resolution was that in the eyes of Blue Licks supporters. They came, they spoke and they might have helped. Only time and the Kentucky General Assembly will tell.

"It is all for the public becoming more involved in policy-making," she added.

The mayor and council told the citizens present that the city has had to go into its reserves the past three years, reserve funds that were supposed to be maintained at a certain level according to the provisions of the bond sales that financed some Carlisle utilities, such as sewer lines.

The bonding companies that purchased the bonds require a certain level of reserve funds to protect their investments, the council said. It has only been in the past few months that the reserve funds were again built up.

Saying that the city was now breaking even in its operations instead of losing money on the services Mayor Power predicted "If everything goes well we'll be all right in two years."

Council members Julian Green, Alec Crawford and Charles Fay did not attend the meeting.

Even though the bets were wagged and Bath County was picked the favorite by many, Nicholas proved that the battle was a script already written, with the outcome finally settled in the Bluejackets' favor.

Mike Sewell led Nicholas County's offense carrying the ball 14 times for 15 yards. Todd Allison carried 16 times for 66 yards and Tommy Bidler carried 13 times for 42 yards.

Sewell also completed 12 out of 21 passes for 131 yards. Mike Hatton had six pass receptions for 67 yards. David McElroy had five receptions for 55 yards, and Barry Bretz had one reception caught out-of-bounds.

Eleven tackles each, for Mike Mattox and Mike Boykin, made them the Bluejackets' defensive leaders. David Davis had eight and two punt returns for 20 yards. Ronnie Sudder had seven. Jackie Wells and Mark Taylor had six each. Mark Vise had five, Pat Letcher had four and break-up one pass and Jerry Edwards had four and one quarterback sack.

Nicholas had 51 first downs to Bath County's six.

The Jackets will travel this Friday to take on arch-rival, Paris Greyhounds. Kickoff is 8 p.m.

SCS news notes

Many acres of Nicholas County are in forest or need to be in forest for best land use. Many of these acres of forest are in small wood lots or odd areas where it is impractical to clear for other use.

Growing Christmas trees could be one land use for a forest product. You can get free information on growing Christmas trees in the South by writing for SA-676 from USDA Forest Service, Information Center, Room 418, 1729 Peachtree Rd., N.W., Atlanta, Georgia 30309.

Dutch Elm disease has been a problem in this area for some few years. Many of our fine shade trees have died due to the Dutch Elm disease. There is research work being done on the control of Dutch Elm disease.

Dutch Elm disease is controlled by: (1) sanitation—prompt removal and destruction of dying trees plus radical surgery of individual symptomatic branches; (2) application of methoxychlor at budbreak; (3) severance of root grafts between diseased and healthy trees; (4) plant resistant trees; (5) fungicide injection on a preventive or curative basis.

Much of our forest has a good number of call trees that will never produce quality products such as lumber. The forest has been cut over many times taking the good trees and leaving the poor trees and trees of poor species. After many years of such harvesting we

have a stand of call trees. The undisturbed trees can be used for fire wood and some other farm use and this would make room for more and better trees. Many people have turned to wood as a fuel. They will buy firewood already cut or will buy trees and cut wood or cut call trees if given free.

The Soil Conservation Service will help you mark the trees that should be cut. This is one of many services The Soil Conservation Service gives. The No. Division of Forestry will also give on-site assistance on your forest. They will mark trees to be cut. They sell tree seedlings for planting. Your local A.S.C.S. office will give financial assistance on planning, fencing, and on taking out call trees.

If you need help on your forest see The Soil Conservation Service or one of the other agencies.

See your local Soil Conservation Service for your conservation problems.
