Farm loans extended

President Carter has signed legislation extending the Farmers Home Administration Economic Emergency Loan Program until Sept. 30, 1981. The program was due to expire on May 15 this year.

William E. Burnette, Farmers Home Administration State Director said, "President Carter's action will enable us to continue the Economic Emergency (EE) Program, not only through the remainder of this year, but through the next fiscal year as well. Although the EE Program was not due to end until May 15, we were just about out of funds when the President signed the bill on March 20."

The EE Program provides direct or guaranteed loans to farmers and ranchers who suffer economic hardship because of area or national economic conditions beyond their control. FmHA provided \$66,438,700 in Economic Emergency assistance to Kentucky farmers last year.

Burnette said, the new law immediately increases the ceiling on outstanding principal for EE loans nationwide from \$4 billion to \$6 billion. FmHA has already obligated the \$4 billion authorized under the agriculture credit act of 1978. The additional \$2 billion is allocated to the states of which Kentucky received \$7,685,000. About half of this allocation will be available this year.

The new law requires that stronger "creditworthiness" criteria be enforced. Any application for an insured loan of \$20,000 or more must be accompanied by letters from at least two private lenders explaining why they turned down the request for a loan. FmHA expects to issue the strengthened regulations within 30 to 60 days.

Jimmy Dale, shot put, 43 ft. 10 1/2 in.; Tony Howard, pole vault, 8 ft. 3 in.; Markland, Dale and Howard received their personal best efforts Monday as did David McGuffey in the triple jump (41 ft. 11 1/2 in., second place) and Keith Williams in the triple jump (41 ft. 3 in. for third place).

Edwards' records were six feet in the high jump, 4 min. 27.2 sec. in the 100 meter run and 2 min. 8 sec. in the 800 meter run.
