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# Ford's Footnotes

Although the General Assembly is not presently in session, your legislators are busy at work with the beginning of a new fiscal year July 1, another interim has started with just committees of the House and the Senate.  
It has been said recently that one of the most important times of serving as a legislator is during the interim. This is when much detailed committee work is done and numerous problems can be thoroughly investigated and researched without haste. Much of the legislation that will be introduced in 1981 will be a result of the work of this interim committee system.  
During the session of the General Assembly, the House and Senate members are assigned to various standing committees. During the interim, those committees are continued to form a joint interim committee. Your senator is assigned to three such committees, education, agriculture and natural resources, and banking and insurance. I have also been assigned to a select energy committee to study all aspects of solar energy and related subjects which may come before the General Assembly in 1981.  
During the interim period I plan to report to you periodically through this column on any areas of interest that may come before any of our committees.  
The Banking and Insurance Committee has already introduced two insurance committees and two committees for finance. I have been assigned as Chairman of the Subcommittee of Financial Institutions. I am also a member of the Subcommittee on Banking, the Agriculture and Natural Resources and Education Committee but not at this date. I believe it is safe to assume that these committees will also be introduced in more detail in the future.  
One other duty that will help keep you during the interim is my selection for another two-year term on the Special LRC Committee for the Review of Personal Services Contracts. This committee is an outgrowth of legislation passed in 1978 by the General Assembly because of the concern for potential waste in personal services contracts. Without question prior to the passage of this legislation, the potential for abuse was great. The 1980 General Assembly addressed this subject once again and put more teeth in the powers of this special committee. Unless an emergency is declared by the Secretary of Finance or the Governor, this committee has the authority to withhold payment on any personal service contract until it is reviewed.  
Since the inception of this committee in July of 1978, millions of dollars have been diverted that were previously spent for personal service contracts. Many of those contracts, without question, are necessary. What this committee has attempted to do is to see that only those contracts that are necessary are awarded. If the service can be performed by a state agency, it is the opinion of this committee that that is the proper method.  
Your senator also serves on a National Committee of the Conference of State Legislators that deals with Science and Technology. This committee is made up of members from many states and will meet approximately four times each calendar year. The area of greatest concern for this committee presently are energy, the disposal of solid waste, and the transportation and disposal of low-level radioactive waste. Radioactive waste is of particular importance to Kentucky since the closing of the Y-12 Plant in 1975. This committee gives us an opportunity to exchange ideas and information with other states to formulate certain plans and bring them back to our own General Assembly for action.  
In future articles, I will attempt to address the actions of one or two committees and any other subjects that may be of interest to you at the time. ## How will it be in 1988?

How will it be in 1988?  
On the American energy scene, there are several phenomena in 1980 that only the train Alaska gas line been completed, but drilling is booming on and offshore all over the North Sea. There are also, plus Georgia Bank, Baltimore Canyon, and southern California, are going up with quantities of petroleum.  
The reason O'Hare leaving everywhere has been liberalized to the extent of the Gulf of Mexico. The active rig count stands at 5,000. Unemployment is two percent.  
Meanwhile, exploration in Mexico and beyond the Norwegian Sea 62nd possible are yielding fabulous discoveries.

Theodore Barrington, senior editor of Oil & Gas Journal, uses those words to describe a possible scenario at the end of a Reagan Bush administration. The emphasis should be on the word "possible." This exciting scenario would be realistic. Mr. Barrington said, if the country grew tired of lean energy and late production.  
At the moment the scenario appears to be an impossible dream, because our energy legislation is set up in such a way as to deny the American people energy independence.

For example, it is extremely difficult for oil companies to secure the right to drill off our coasts. In key areas of Alaska, the oil companies are barred from drilling. Yet Prof. Jack J. McKern, professor of chemical engineering at the University of Texas, says that the United States will have to find "10 more Prudhoe Bays" in order "to meet the tremendous energy demand from a self sufficient energy base by the year 2000."  
There's hope of finding a major new oil field off the coast of Newfoundland. PetroCanada's vice president for exploration said in July that the offshore area "could yield the first and only frontier oil production to come to market in the 1980's." But developing this offshore field will be in the company's estimation, require billions of dollars for production systems.

In addition, geologists believe the Arctic National Wildlife Reservation may hold a Prudhoe Bay-sized reservoir of oil, but federal legislation prevents its development.  
The chance of American companies finding the money needed for exploration and development is greatly limited by the so-called "windfall" profits tax the Carter administration pushed through Congress. A recent report of National Fuel Environmental Balance said that the purpose of this legislation is to have more money available for "continued senseless spending." Twenty-five percent of the money raised by this tax will go to help assistance handouts. This diversion of money from energy exploration and development to welfare is a crime against the interests of the American people who desperately need new, lower cost energy sources in North America.

One of the action programs that should be initiated by a new administration is repeal of the mislabeled "windfall" profits tax. It should be part of an energy package that would support the Department of Energy and return the benefits off to the market economy.  
If the energy industries aren't allowed to retain their earnings for development, the American people can expect to live with worsening energy problems the rest of their lives.
