Commission has approved rail rate hike

The Kentucky Railroad Commission has approved an increase in Kentucky intrastate rail rates on all commodities except iron, steel scrap and other recyclables.

The increase will vary with each commodity but most will be increased by four percent.

Kentucky Utilities Company protested the increase at the September and October meetings of the commission. Representatives from the company said they felt coal was bearing more than its share of rate increases.

Railroad representatives said coal would receive a four percent increase as would other commodities.

The need for an increase in rates was attributed to an increase in costs, railroad representatives said. Cost increases were due to increased wages, payroll taxes, material and supply costs, health and welfare benefits and interest expenses, they said.

The commission concluded that the increase was necessary so that the railroads could provide good service and adequate equipment to the public.

A decrease in the quality of service or equipment would cause more problems than a small increase in rates, according to the commission.

The increase in rail rates will involve the principal railroads in Kentucky and will increase their revenue by an estimated \$1.4 million.

Challenges KU rate increase
Attorney General Steven L. Beshear announced recently his office has filed a complaint in the Franklin Circuit Court challenging the rate increase granted the Kentucky Utilities Co. by the Energy Regulatory Commission.

KU requested \$20 million additional revenue and was awarded \$7.7 million.

"This action by the Energy Regulatory Commission is unprecedented in awarding a major investor-owned utility 62 percent of the revenue it requested," said Beshear. "The shareholders of KU received a significant increase in profits when their return on equity was increased from 13 percent to 13.9 percent. This excessive and inflationary rate increase is a severe burden on the customers of KU, particularly senior citizens and those on fixed incomes."

According to Beshear, the attorney general's expert witness testified that KU's coal inventory was \$20 million in excess of the optimum level. The Energy Regulatory Commission agreed that KU's coal inventory was excessive, but failed to reduce KU's capital structure by this \$20 million. Consequently, said Beshear, the Kentucky ratepayers are forced to pay for KU's bad management decisions.

"If allowed to stand, the commission's order will set a bad precedent which could allow every utility in Kentucky to receive all the money they ask for, regardless of either their need or the consumer's ability to pay," Beshear said.

'Nova' airs on KET

"Nova," public television's long-running science series, looks at a broad range of scientific and technical topics during the month of December. Produced by WGBH, Boston, "Nova" airs on KET Tuesdays at 9 p.m. (ET), 8 p.m. (CT).

Leading off this month's "Nova" offerings is "Moving Still," premiering Tuesday, Dec. 2. "Moving Still" reveals the extraordinary story of how photography and more recent techniques of freezing moments of time bring us remarkable insights into our world and life itself.

In "Moving Still," "Nova" traces the visually exciting history of photography from primitive cameras to cinematography's revelations of behavior and processes which are too slow or too fast for the human eye to perceive.

Premiering on "Nova" Tuesday, Dec. 9 is "A Touch Of Sensitivity." This one-hour program examines the touch cells in the human skin—possibly the most highly developed sensory cells of the body. Touch provides the basis for our understanding of the world outside ourselves. Yet because it is so unconscious, we take it for granted.

"Nova" explores the hidden meaning and extraordinary power of this keenly developed sense.

Then, on Tuesday, Dec. 16, "Nova" focuses on air safety in "The Safety Factor." In this close-up on the risks of flying, "Nova" joins the pilot and the co-pilot on the flight of a Laker Airways DC-10 as it crosses the Atlantic from London to Los Angeles. In recent months, DC-10's have been involved in major air disasters. However, "Nova" observes that even the most carefully built plane is subject to human error, the cause of the majority of air disasters. "The Safety Factor" raises the question: Is air travel safe enough?

Next on "Nova" is "The Red Deer of Rhum," airing Tuesday, Dec. 23. In this program, "Nova" travels to Rhum, an island off the coast of Scotland and the home of what is probably the world's last remaining population of red deer.

"Nova" joins a research team of scientists as they closely observe a year in the life of these wild animals. The behavior they discover is in harsh contrast to the gentle fiction of the Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer jingle.

Turning to a much more abstract topic on Tuesday, Dec. 30, "Nova" examines the phenomenon of time. Renowned actor/comedian Dudley Moore is featured in a serious, yet humorous quest for the meaning of time in "It's About Time." In his quest, Moore meets fifth century philosopher St. Augustine, physicist Albert Einstein and science writer Isaac Asimov as they explain the paradoxical properties of the fourth dimension.

"Nova" is seen each Tuesday on KET at 9 p.m. (ET), 8 p.m. (CT).
