KENTUCKY AND KANSAS HAVE A CLOSE CONNECTION
LEXINGTON — The Kentucky Wildcats face another football toughie Saturday night when the Kansas Jayhawks invade Rupp Arena. It's surprising to me that it will be only the thirteenth meeting between these two traditional powers in view of their close connection.
The connection is Adolph Rupp, the man who built Kentucky's great basketball tradition. The late Wildcat coach played his college basketball at Kansas University and was a native of the Sunflower state. College basketball's record is still Rupp's 874 wins. The man he beat out was his old coach, Phog Allen. Allen is second in number of wins with 771.
I find it a little strange the two men didn't face each other but once in view of the long tenure both had as head coach at their schools. The only time Rupp and Allen faced each other in the arena was in 1950. Allen brought his Jayhawks to Memorial Coliseum. It set up a confrontation between the two best centers in college basketball: Kentucky's Bill Spivey and Kansas' Clyde Lovellette. I was a spectator high up in the stands that night and Spivey absolutely ate Lovellette alive. When Lovellette fouled out, Coach Rupp took Spivey out of the game and the place went wild. Kentucky won 68 to 59.
Coach Rupp's first visit to his alma mater came nine years later. Phog Allen had retired. Kentucky didn't have one of its better teams. I was broadcasting the games by then and I don't think I ever saw Coach Rupp as nervous before a game as he was that day. His team had lost two straight going into the Kansas game but it paid on the line that night and won 77 to 72 in overtime.
Kentucky and Kansas play more frequently now. Most of the games have been close with the Wildcats dominating the series. But the game I never forget was in 1977. Jon B. Hall was in his fifth season as head coach. Rupp had retired and was ill. We got to the hotel after Kentucky's 73 to 66 win in Lawrence, Kansas when we got the word. Coach Rupp was dead.

(7) An ordinance adopting the City of Carlisle, Kentucky annual budget for the fiscal year 1-1-81 through 12-31-81 by estimating revenues and resources and appropriating funds for the operation of city government.
The third and seventh ordinances were passed and adopted under a state of emergency, as it was necessary to start collecting license fees, and put the budget into effect by Jan. 1, 1981.
(Editor's note: Under KRS 43A a copy of the budget adopted and passed by the City must be published.)

Christmas dinner to be held
After debating the issue of a Christmas dinner for city employees at length, Council voted to have a potluck dinner at the new Carlisle Armory on Dec. 17 with the City furnishing meat and drinks. A roll call vote was made with Paul and Gord voting negatively. They stated the full meal should be furnished and maybe a band hired to provide music. Council agreed at the November meeting to have Jerry Lundergan's Catering Service in Lexington serve the dinner, but it was reported that the fee would be too expensive.

Eugene Shapp appeared before Council concerning dedicating the street to his housing addition, to the City. He was requested to bring a plat of the property to the January meeting for consideration by Council.

Burley demand remains strong

Demand remained strong for burley tobacco sold during the second week of auctions. The Federal-State Market News Service reports the general average held at record levels — \$156 per hundred pounds. No significant difference was noted in the price of burley compared with wild. Quality was a little better than opening week. Volume ranged from light to heavy at the various auction centers and the amount placed under loan was minute.

By the latest crop estimate about 46 percent of the current crop has been sold.
Gross sales for the week ending Dec. 4 totaled 145,737,294 pounds and averaged \$166 per hundred — up 10 cents from opening week. The season figure stands at 270,000,200 pounds averaging \$158.93. For the first two weeks of the year 207.8 million pounds averaged \$146.96. Baled tobacco accounted for 14,355,476 pounds of the weekly figure.

averaging \$166.94 and 26,087,087 for the season averaging \$166.02.
Reales totaled 10,968,293 pounds or 7.5 percent of sales this week and 14,814,787 pounds (5.5 percent) for the season.
Most grade averages were unchanged from the week before, holding at \$166 per hundred pounds. About the only marketings selling below this level was nonstick which ranged from \$163 to \$166.
