- 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar

Preparing your home for winter storms

(Editor's Note: This is the second of a four-part series by Nicholas native W.J. Buntin Jr., of Frankfort.)

Winter storms pose a threat to Kentucky, even if they are at home when bad weather strikes to warn Kentucky Disaster and Emergency Services Executive Director Wilbur H. Buntin Jr. "With winter approaching, it's a good idea to get your home prepared for the season," he said.

Be prepared for isolation at home during winter storms. "If you live in a rural area, make sure you could survive at home for a week or two in case a storm isolated you and makes it impossible for you to leave," Buntin said.

Keep an adequate supply of heating fuel on hand and use it sparingly as regular supplies may be curtailed by storm conditions. If necessary, conserve fuel by keeping the house cooler than usual, or by closing off some rooms temporarily.

Stock an emergency supply of food and water, Buntin advised. "These supplies would be needed during any natural disaster," he said. Supplies should include food that requires no cooking or refrigeration and emergency cooking facilities in case of power failure. Well-balanced nutritional meals allow the body to produce its own heat efficiently, especially quick energy foods like raisins and other dried fruit.

Beware of possible fire hazards due to overheated coal or oil-burning stoves, fireplaces, heaters or furnaces. Keep stoves, tools and equipment needed to fight a fire, in case fire department assistance is not available. Severe winter storms can knock out power lines, Buntin said. Have a flashlight, extra batteries or candles and matches and a battery-powered radio with extra batteries. The radio will allow you to follow the storm's progress and keep you posted on any emergency information broadcasts by local authorities.

Downed power lines can affect not only lights but heating equipment as well. If a furnace is controlled by a thermostat and electricity is out of operation, the furnace probably will not operate and heating fuel will be needed.

Emergency heating equipment that should allow at least one room of the house to stay warm enough to be livable. This could be a camp stove with fuel, or a supply of wood or coal if there is a fireplace.

However, use extreme caution with emergency heating equipment. Buntin said. Proper ventilation is essential and extra caution must be taken to prevent fires. To learn how to handle alternative heat sources safely, talk to a local dealer; he'll be listed in the yellow pages of your telephone directory under "heating."

If a house should lose heat, keep water pipes from freezing by wrapping them in insulation made for water

pipes, or in layers of old newspapers, taping the ends and tying them around the pipes. Cover the newspapers with plastic to keep out the moisture. If it is extremely cold there is a danger of freezing, cut the faucets drip a little.

Know where the valve for shutting off the water coming into the house or apartment is located. As a last resort shut off the main valve and drain all the pipes. Wrap pipes with rags and your hot water over the rags, with the faucets still open.

"Weathering winter storms at home won't be as difficult if you've prepared for it," Buntin said.

Christmas toy shopping tips

Shopping for Christmas toys can be a lot easier and the resulting gift a lot more rewarding if toy shoppers keep a few basic tips in mind.

One-fifth of all children to children are toy-related, according to Edsel Moore, manager of the consumer product Human Resources.

Injuries can be substantially reduced if toys are properly selected, he adds.

More listed these tips for shoppers: — Choose a toy that matches the child's interests. Toys should "fit" the child's age, interests and abilities. Labels on toys offer guidance to selecting toys according to a child's age. Be sure to read all labels carefully. — Consider the ages of all children in a family when buying toys. A chemistry set for a 12-year-old can be dangerous if the child does not have a safe place to use it or a safe spot to keep it away from a curious four-year-old brother or sister. — When toy shopping, do not be motivated by price alone. Look for qualities such as durability, construction and educational potential. — Inspect electrical toys closely and look for a symbol of endorsement by an independent testing organization such as Underwriters Laboratories. — Avoid toys with projectiles and toys that make loud noises. — Check the toy for sharp edges, points or small parts.
