ORDINANCE RELATING TO FRANCHISE FOR CABLE TELEVISION SYSTEM IN NICHOLAS COUNTY, KENTUCKY

Section 1: Any person, partnership, firm, corporation or individual, who is engaged in the business of operating a cable television system in the unincorporated portion of the county outside City of Carlisle, Kentucky - setting franchise and user fees, minimum number of viewing channels to be furnished; other terms and conditions.

Section 2: Any motor vehicle which is subject to this license fee shall be charged Five (5.00) Dollars for each and every motor vehicle owned and operated. All motor vehicle dealers shall procure license fees for each dealer tag or plate held by them. Said license fee shall be obtainable at the office of the City Clerk Treasurer.

Section 3: Upon the purchase of each such license from the City Clerk, the licensee sticker which shall be placed in the lower right hand corner of each motor vehicle, or in some other prominent place of the vehicle, having no windshield.

Section 4: The period for which such license shall be valid shall be the calendar year, beginning on December 31st, and the last day of the calendar year. Each year shall be February 1st through January 31st.

Section 5: Transfer from one motor vehicle to another of this license issued pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance shall be allowed.

Section 6: Any person, firm, partnership or corporation, who desires to transfer a vehicle for which this license is required, and acquires another vehicle to its own use, shall pay a license fee of Five (5.00) Dollars for each such additional license procured.

Section 7: Any person, firm, partnership, corporation or individual, who acquires a vehicle subject to this license sticker shall procure another sticker for the same on the first day of the license period.

Section 8: Any person, firm, partnership or corporation, who is involved in the forgoing violation of this ordinance, shall be liable to pay a fine of Fifteen (15.00) Dollars, not more than \$100.00 Dollars for each such violation.

Section 9: All license fees collected hereunder shall be deposited in the account to be used for the construction, repair and maintenance of the City of Carlisle.

Section 10: If any part of this ordinance is for any reason declared to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the remaining provisions hereof.

Section 11: All provisions of this ordinance in part heretofore repealed.

Section 12: This ordinance shall become effective immediately after its passage and publication as required by law.

Section 13: William Power, Mayor of Carlisle, Kentucky, is authorized to execute this ordinance.

Section 14: Passed on First Reading December 18, 1980. Adopted on Second Reading December 18, 1980. Signed by Mayor December 23, 1980.
