## Hydro power plant at Cave Run?

A Georgia company has filed a preliminary permit application with the U.S. Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to build a hydroelectric power plant at Cave Run Dam, Saranac Energy Corporation proposes to build a powerhouse on the eastern bank of Licking River, along

with transmission lines and other necessary facilities to generate 15,400 KW (or an alternate plan to produce 9,300 KW). It proposes to tie into a 69 KV transmission line owned by Kentucky Utilities.

The applicant has requested 36-month permits for a feasibility study, preliminary design study, hydrological studies, environment and social studies and soil foundation data which is estimated to cost \$100,000.

To expedite construction No new roads or new dam construction is expected in the study. If implemented, some changes in the method of allowing the water to flow through the dam would be necessary. The plan proposes the "most practical and economical" method to convey the water through the dam and to the turbines appears to be to line the existing 15 foot diameter concrete conduit with a steel sleeve. The annulus

between the sleeve and conduit can then be back filled with concrete. This procedure is deemed necessary since the existing conduit is unlikely to withstand the additional pressures caused by the installation of hydro-power facilities.

The powerhouse would be located on the side of the existing stilling basin. This will provide for easier flow control during periods when all the water is not passing through the turbine, according to a report by the Saranac firm.

Project cost \$12,500,000. On an investment of \$12,000,000 for the No. 1 alternative plant \$1,250,000 would be generated annually for an 18 percent net return over a 30-year period. Plan 2 is a lesser investment but would still return 18 percent.

The U.S. Corps of Engineers, which owns the dam area, has completed a preliminary assessment as part of the National Hydro-power Study and it shows the proposal for a hydroelectric plant at Cave Run Lake to be feasible. The company would generate the electricity and sell it to a transmission company, the most logic being Kentucky Utilities. Cave Run Lake has seasonal and flood control pools of 8,270 and 14,670 acres and the hydro-power facility could work under either condition.

This application for a preliminary permit is seen by one local official as simply a request for first consideration should all governmental agencies approve such a proposal and becomes ready to hear a serious approach from a company wishing to build the facility. Saranac is not the only company interested in building an electricity generating plant at Cave Run Lake. The Bath County Planning Commission entered into an agreement with Eastern State Energy and Resources, Inc. to build a facility there, with the cost to receive five percent of the yearly gross.
