Kay's Kitchen

Valentine's Day will be here before you know it, so get your heart-shaped pans, cookie cutters or what have you, and make the most of this special day. January was a long month and it is time to get a bit of celebrating. Get your friends together for a meal and enjoy yourself.

STUFFED CHICKEN BREASTS
1 chicken, broiled and sliced over 6 ounces sharp cheese, cubed
6 slices dried soup
1 cup mushroom soup
1 1/2 ounce carton sour cream
1 package dried onion soup mix
Cut breasts in half, skin, bone and pound each piece between plastic wrap. Anyway fatness as best you can without tearing the meat. Place a slice of beef on each piece. Divide the cheese into six equal parts. Place equal amount of cheese on beef, roll up, fasten with toothpick. Place in greased baking dish. Mix soup, sour cream and soup mix; pour over chicken and bake 1 1/2 hours at 350 degrees, or 2 hours at 275 degrees.

SUGAR COOKIES
These cut nicely with heart-shaped cutter.
2 cups sifted flour (about 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder)
1/2 teaspoon sugar
1 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
1 cup margarine
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 tablespoon cream or milk
Mix and sift 1/4 cup flour, baking powder and salt. Cream shortening until soft; beat in sugar, vanilla and cream. Stir in flour mixture, then gradually add the remaining flour until dough is just stiff enough to roll. Cut thoroughly. On lightly floured board roll 1/8 inch thick, cut with floured cutters. Sprinkle with additional sugar and bake in moderately hot oven (375 degrees) for 8 to 10 minutes.

CHICKEN-BROCCOLI CASSEROLE
1 1/2 pound fryer
Worcestershire sauce
Onion
Celery
1 1/2 10-ounce packages frozen broccoli spears
Salt
1/4 cup average lemon, or lemon to taste
Juice
2 10-ounce packages frozen broccoli spears
2 10 1/2-ounce cans cream of chicken soup
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1 tablespoon corn powder, or to taste, if desired
1/4 cup Parmesan cheese
1 cup soft buttered, toasted bread crumbs, not too small
Paprika
Roll chicken & tomatoes in bread crumbs, roll in flour, season with the onion and celery, or until tender. Remove from liquid and cool. Cut into bite-size pieces. Undercook broccoli in the amount of water specified on package. Arrange broccoli, turning every other spear, in lightly buttered

Alternatives are given for framing fiber art

Framing isn't the answer to attractive display of all art work, especially when the creative medium is fiber. Take an bedroom quilt, for example. It would be perfect adorning the bedroom wall. The frame is not the art work itself. The same goes for rugs, weavings and some stitcheries. Inexpensive pine frames, called canvas stretchers, can be used under batiks, fabric panels, needle work and rugs. These are just a few of the alternatives to a mat to match the completed measurements. Glue the mat to the top of the stretcher; this prevents the frame from showing or warping through fabric panels. Next, stretch the fiber art over the wooden frame. Staple the middle of each of the four sides. Then staple the fabric at two-inch intervals. Glue a mat across the back of the canvas stretcher or cover with plastic tape. This prevents the staples from scratching the wall and gives the art work a neater appearance. Reuse suggests lightweight, soft 11 pieces, such as quilt blocks and needlepoints, be stretched over a piece of rug. These are then plywood or pressed board. She recommends putting a layer of quilt batting between the backing board and the fiber art for a three-dimensional look. Use carpentry or bottlebrush brist to lace the edges of the rug. Sew the two boards together. Come in from the back so the screw heads won't show. Sawtooth hangers can be used on the back hanging the piece on the wall.

Two flat mats can be used when hanging a heavy piece so that it will hold its shape. A weaving, for example, says Reece. First, finish the mat as desired. Then place one edge of the fiber art between the two mats. Wood glue can be used to hold the art in place. Screw the two boards together. Come in from the back so the screw heads won't show. Sawtooth hangers can be used on the back hanging the piece on the wall.

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Effective date of legislation is July 15

The effective date of legislation passed during the 1980 regular session of the Kentucky General Assembly is July 15, 1980, according to an opinion issued by the office of the attorney general. In an opinion requested by Legislative Research Committee Director Vic Ballard Jr., Assistant Deputy Attorney General Walter Herndon said the effective date of any legislation passed before April 15, the presumed date of legislative adjournment, would become effective despite the change in fiscal years.

"July 15 would be the 90th day following adjournment, thereby making all ordinary legislation effective on July 15," Herndon stated. "Regardless of whether the legislation becomes effective before or after the beginning of the next fiscal year, any reference to appropriations contained in the legislation must be amended and provided for in the budget bill for the next biennium," said Herndon.

Listing Period - Homestead Exemption

The PVA office is now in the listing period—January 1 to March 1—for the tax roll preparation for 1980. Each taxpayer should report his property at this time.

- All new homes, improvements to existing homes, and new buildings (barns etc.)
- All mobile homes located in Nicholas County. Mobile homes that have been sold during the year should be reported.
- Cars, boats, travel trailers, etc.
- Intangibles (stocks, bonds, mortgages, liens and accounts receivable)

Homestead Exemption—A property owner must apply for the Homestead Exemption before March 1, 1980. To be eligible for the Exemption, a property owner must be 65 years of age during the year of 1980 and own and live on his property. Those who signed up will be carried over for 1980 automatically. My office will be open from 8:30 to 4:30 weekdays and from 9:00 to 12:00 on Saturdays (weather permitting) during January and February. You may call at 289-5460.

Ford's Footnotes

The House and Senate have handled the fourth legislative week differently, as both chambers adjusted their work load around a mid-week legislative holiday.

Members of the House leadership went to Washington to gather information necessary to promulgate legislation pertaining to the state's strip-mining regulations.

The Senate has passed two measures that are aimed at the small consumer's financial well-being in the face of inflation. My Senate Bill 75 removed interest rate limits on loans of less than \$15,000 for savings and loan institutions. A similar measure was passed by the 1979 Special Session for state chartered banks, but because of the limitations of the call for a special session, the measure could not apply to savings and loan companies. In essence, the interest limit had made loans virtually unavailable for individual consumers seeking small amounts of money. I hope this legislation will make more funds available for smaller loans.

Senate Bill 31 would increase the personal property allowance in a bankruptcy petition. The bill actually exempts Kentucky from the federal bankruptcy act. The federal bill was making it much more difficult for the small borrower with little net worth to obtain a loan. I am a co-sponsor of this legislation.

The House Appropriations and Revenue Committee is moving bills aimed at improving the agencies' accounting of the state's revenues. House Bill 70 would require the Finance Department to comply with accounting principles approved by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants.

House Bill 166 would revise the property tax assessment calendar, and House Bill 161 would make changes in the law setting a four percent ceiling on property tax revenue growth.

Governor John Y. Brown has conducted several meetings with legislative leaders over the past few weeks concerning the state's current financial status and a joint meeting of the House and Senate Appropriations and Revenue Committees has been scheduled so he might update those panels on the condition of the state for the next two years. Work on the state government budget for the 1980-82 biennium is expected to begin in the next couple of weeks.
