The new law comes to Frankfort as it seems to do each year. This year it slowed the progress of legislation.

The bill has been passed by both chambers and sent to the Governor. This bill will increase the expense allowance for sheriffs from \$2,100 per year to \$3,650. The bill is awaiting the governor's signature.

The Senate has favorably acted on 30 bills, which are now in the House awaiting their decision, while the House has moved 25 bills to the Senate. Two House Bills have been adopted by both chambers, but the Senate amended them and they will now return to the House for that body to agree with the Senate's changes. One of the bills (HB 42) relates to the waiting period in divorces where there are no dependent children; the other measure (HB 134) relates to deputy county judge-executives and their duties.

The committees in the House and Senate have conducted long meetings this week as bills in committee have been carefully scrutinized. Public hearings have considered search and seizure, the question of physician assistants, and emergency medical services. The other committees have conducted their business, the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations and Revenue have been talking with state government agency heads to determine the state's budget needs for the next two years.

The leadership of both the House and the Senate have met with members and determined that despite a gloomy revenue prediction, the approach to operating is to cut programs rather than seek additional revenue.

650 million pound burley crop seen

By Bennett Beach. Having just marketed their smallest crop in many years, burley tobacco growers are optimistic at other estimates for 1980 - the possibility of a 650-million pound output, or even higher.

Word was received last week by the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association of the decline reached at Washington of the 1980 production target which the USDA will demand to reach last year.

The 1980 production target with the basic quota reduced at 61 million pounds, would allow about a 700-million effective quota. In recent years, the actual marketings have run about 86 percent of the effective quota.

The state's revenue commissioner has pointed out to members of the A & R committee that legislation to endorse existing tax sources would generate considerable revenue. He told us that the state has some \$150 million in uncollectible taxes and could collect these funds.

I have introduced Senate Bill 44 which is intended to aid in the collection of personal property tax on automobiles. According to the Revenue Department, much of this tax is not being collected properly.

As more legislation is introduced, there are more bills that are of interest. The Senate last week received two bills that have traditionally generated a great deal of public interest. Senate Bill 145 seeks to require all beverage containers to carry a five cent deposit to discourage littering.

"We are all proud of the job the burley dealers are doing in exporting our product," said McDaniel, citing that 1979 pounds went overseas in 37%. Also contributing to the rise in exports, he noted, was the market associated with the Burley co-op, Frank Snodgrass, executive director of the Burley and Dark Leaf Tobacco Export Association, and Dick Travis, blending expert, who for many years has been teaching foreign tobacco companies how to use U.S. burley to make blended cigarettes.

The Burley Association recently shipped two sample hogsheads of aged burley to Florida and Hawaii, creating a demand there, McDaniel reported. He added Dick Travis' blending services are being offered free to the Republic of China.

"We are dependent upon experts to keep our production up," said McDaniel, "and this requires quality burley. We operate at a world of free trade. As of now there has not been any innovation that would lower the cost of production any way close to making our tobacco competitive with foreign burley."

Dr. J.B. Shannon, farmer and retired UK professor, warned that relief would lead to further restrictions which "would put tobacco on the assembly line and destroy the market."

Bailed tobacco, however, Federal crop insurance, cigarette consumption and the economic importance of burley are other topics at the hearing.

Tom A. Norvell, board chairman of the Burley Leaf Tobacco Dealers Association, listed several problems of handling United burley in July 1979. He asserted it is difficult to judge quality of bales in the 100-pound auction sales.

The AAA survey covers service stations in six central and eastern Kentucky counties. The average cost in February is 10.3 cents for a gallon of regular grade, and full-service stations is \$1.17 for regular.
