

NCHS to host 37th District

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The district finals will be held Saturday, March 8 at 7:30 p.m. Girls at Harrison. The NCHS Lady Bluejackets drew district opponents Paris for their first contest. The 37th District girls' games will be played at Harrison County High School for the same week the boys play in Paris, but on alternate nights. The girls' tournament starts Saturday, March 5 with a doubleheader involving all four district teams beginning at 6:30 p.m. NCHS takes on Paris in the opener and at 8 p.m. Harrison and Bourbon clash.

The girls' finals will be held Friday, March 7 at 4 p.m. All the games will be played in the Harrison County gym. The boys' games will be single-session games with contests starting Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday at 7:30 p.m. in Paris.

Best chance? The district matchup announcements come in the final weeks of one of the best seasons the NCHS boys' team has ever put together. With a 16-2 record as of Tuesday morning the boys have beaten every team in the region but Mason County and Harrison and have almost bested Bourbon once at home this season. This Saturday night they take Harrison County in Cynthiana for the survival of a rivalry they have back to the days when Carlisle High and

Cynthiana High tangled in the gym and on the gridiron. Harrison is slipping, lately, dropping games to Bourbon in Cynthiana and escaping from Pendleton County with a one-point win. (The Harrison County Board of Education is sponsoring a chili supper before this Saturday's game in the high school cafeteria adjacent to the gym.) If the Jackets make it to Mayvilleville after this year with no less than seven Mason County from making it three in a row. The 19th Region host school, Clark and Harrison are always considered contenders but Clark's play

has been spotty and Harrison has been up and down. Pendleton is usually a tournament team and under new coach Woodie Crum could go further than some like. 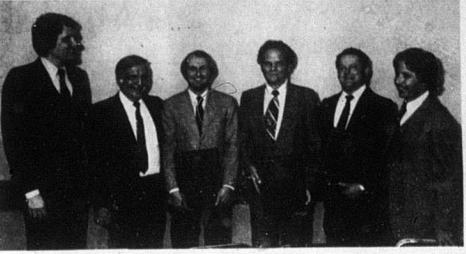
