State revenues increase but Road Fund lagging

Total state revenue receipts for the first seven months of the fiscal year showed an increase of 1.7 percent in the General Fund and 17.8 percent in total agency funds while the state Road Fund only gained 0.3 percent, according to a report issued last Thursday by Finance Secretary George Atkins and Revenue Commissioner Robert Alphin.

The report indicated that a better comparison of tax receipts is beginning to emerge since processing delays had been ironed out. These include the flood situation in Frankfort last year and the property tax delay of this year.

The General Fund increase of 1.7 percent is slightly less than the 6.6 percent increase previously estimated for the fiscal year.

A decrease in license and privilege taxes has been attributed to more coal severance tax money being transferred to the Transportation Fund. Coal severance tax is actually up by 4.3 percent over last year, the report showed.

Ifed the coal severance transfer not been made, the Transportation Fund would show a decline of 1.3 percent, the report said. Federal grants improved somewhat in January but still have not caught up with last year.

The 17.8 percent increase in agency funds reflects a larger share of federal grants. Education has received \$5.3

million for school food assistance; \$30.3 million for ESBA (Elementary Secondary Education Act) Title I; \$4.5 million for ESBA Title IV; \$1.7 million for exceptional children and \$11.7 million for vocational education.

The Department for Human Resources also received \$28.8 million for medical assistance benefits and \$41.1 million for Aid to Families with Dependent Children during the seven month period.

The report also shows the Department of Revenue issued more individual income tax refunds in January 1980 than in any previous January — \$3,329 refunds averaging \$7.46 for a total of \$2.6 million.
