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Kay's Kitchen

Perhaps you get into the kitchen preparing over meals during February when it was so cold. One reason was the oven helped keep the kitchen warm, and it was nice to have everything ready at once. The oven cooking saves energy when several different dishes can be cooked at one time. It'll still make a bit of planning, but it's worth it. You don't have to have everything cooked the same length of time, put it in the oven later. The only thing that must remain the same would be the cooking temperature.

Here is a meal that will get you started towards planning more oven meals. Remember if you have room in the oven you might want to include a dish to be used later or frozen.

SWEET AND SOUL HEAT LOAF
 1 can (15oz.) tomato sauce
 1/2 cup light brown sugar
 1/2 cup vinegar
 1 teaspoon prepared mustard
 2 pounds ground beef
 1/2 pound ground pork
 2 eggs slightly beaten
 1/2 cup minced onion
 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese
 1 tablespoon salt

Mix together tomato sauce, sugar, vinegar and mustard. Mix together remaining ingredients and one cup sauce mixture. Pack into 1 1/2 quart casserole. Pour 1/2 cup of sauce over top. Bake for 1 hour. The remaining sauce may be heated and used when serving the meat loaf.

Jackets prep for district with OT win over Deming

Nicholas County's 4-4-5 defeat over the Deming Blackdevils last Friday night at Mt. Olivet was just the warmup the Bluejackets needed to send them blazing into this week's district tournament.

The overtime period was forced upon Nicholas County when the Bluejackets committed a foul in the lane just as the buzzer sounded. That sent Deming to the stripe, hitting one of two, tying the score 29 all, and pushing another three minutes of game action over on the County.

Deming was ready for the Jacket attack in the first quarter. Joe Mitchell scored a goal to counteract the one David McCuffey hit tying the score two all. A jumper by Mike Hatton sent Nicholas out front 4-2. Mark Vice took Nicholas slowly along in the lead. 12, Mike Sowell four, Donald McCuffey scored two buckets and Mike Sowell dumped two free throws in at the stripe, but Deming's Mitchell scored nine and added the Blackdevils in taking a one-point, 26-3, advantage at the quarter's end.

The Bluejackets still weakened the Blackdevils blame in the fourth quarter. Nicholas put "the freem" into effect and stalled the ball for over five minutes. The Bluejackets had the win seemingly wrapped-up with nine seconds remaining in the game and possession of the ball, but Deming stole the rebound and Mitchell scored putting the Jackets up by one. A foul by Nicholas just as time lapsed wrapped up the Bluejacket's package and called for an overtime with the fourth quarter score at 36 all.

The pressure was all on the overtime. Vice aided the Jackets by hitting an errorless four for four at the line; Sowell added two and Hatton one. At the battle's end, the Bluejackets had conquered the powerful Blackdevils 48-43.

Nicholas ends their regular season 15-3, with the district and a tough game against Bourbon County remaining. Mike Hatton was the Bluejacket high-point man with 15 points. Mark Vice followed with 13, David McCuffey 12, Mike Sowell four, Donald McCuffey three, and Jerry Edwards one.

10 Stamler employee children to receive MMI scholarships

Millersburg Military Institute has announced the grant of an annual scholarship program by the W.R. Stamler Corporation. For the 1979-1980 academic year a scholarship grant of \$5,000 was awarded to the school as tuition assistance primarily for the benefit of children of Stamler Corporation employees. Currently eight children are availing themselves of this educational opportunity.

Approved by the corporation's board of directors at its last semi-annual meeting, the Stamler Scholarship Board was granted in honor of Mary H. and W. Raymond Stamler. The policy provides for one-half the tuition of 10 day students each year. Hereafter, the MMI scholarship program has been a modest annual effort in providing tuition assistance to worthy students who need financial assistance. The new Stamler Scholarship is a significant gift both to the school and to the children involved and more than doubles the school's ability to provide tuition assistance for these children.

The provision of all scholarship assistance is determined by the MMI Scholarship Committee chaired by Dick Lutton, vice-chairman of the MMI Board of Trustees. The committee receives applications addressed to the school throughout the year, and makes determinations prior to the beginning of each semester.

This scholarship grant follows closely the matching donation gift made to MMI of \$40,000 annually over the next five years by an anonymous donor. These two gifts along with the matching funds being received will be used to equal an endowment at MMI after current obligations have been met. Colonel James B. Leer, MMI trustee in charge of development, reports that nearly \$5,000 of his \$10,000 matching fund target for this academic year had already been received.
