ELECTRIC CARS

A reader writes to ask why electric cars are being held off the market. She thinks it's a conspiracy by the big oil companies and the auto manufacturers. There is no conspiracy. The first outfit that can produce a really workable electric car will reap a fortune. A lot of people are trying. The Energy Department is spending \$100 million on a research program, hoping to put 100,000 electric vehicles on the road by 1986, and 15 million by the year 2000.

The prime reason to develop an electric car is, of course, the diminishing oil supply. Today there are some 40 million cars, gas-guzzling cars on the road, consuming more than 100 billion gallons of gas annually. As it becomes more difficult and expensive to find and drill for crude oil, the cost of gasoline can only go up. The electric-powered vehicle is a good alternative. It is noiseless and non-polluting. It uses energy only when running; when it's stopped, it files the driver shut the engine. As a result, "Nothing beats electric vehicle for economy of transportation." One company figures that the juice to charge a battery costs 23 cents per mile. Maintenance costs are low because there are no radiators, no oil, no fuel pumps, oil filters or spark plugs.

Then why are there currently only about 2,000 electric cars in America? Slow speed and short range. Most electric cars have a top speed of about 40 mph - okay for city driving, too slow for the open road - and batteries have to be recharged after only 70 to 100 miles.

Electric batteries are heavy, space-consuming, and usually an electric car today costs about \$7,500. But will five or ten years and mass production of electric cars be a strain? It should be! Most significantly, however, the cost of electricity today costs about \$7.00. By 1980, McNaughton Synd.
